Pettigrew Regional Library News

The Regional Board of the Pettigrew Regional Library met Thursday evening, November 17, in Plymouth. Those present were: Mrs. J. Robert Campbell, chairman; Thomas Shepard, vice chairman; T. Reynold Spruill, treasurer; Paul Liverman, secretary; E. E. Harrell, Mrs. Sidney McMullan, Mrs. George Mack, Mrs. C. E. Morris and Mrs. Eugenia R. Babylon.

Values were placed upon the two bookmobiles which formerly belonged to Washington and Tyrrell counties, and are now used to serve both areas in the region. As soon as necessary reciprocal payments are made by Chowan to the other two counties, by Tyrrell to Washington and vice versa, the bookmobiles will be owned by the Pettigrew Region.

It was decided that State holidays will be observed by all libraries and librarians in the region. They are as follows: New Year's Day, Easter Monday, Confederate Memorial Day, July 4th, Labor Day, Veterans Day, Thanksgiving and Christmas.

Several days vacation are granted at Christmas time, depending upon which day it falls. This year library service will be discontinued Friday, December 23, through

Monday, December 26. The next meeting of the Regional Board will be held January 19 at 8 P. M., in Columbia at the Court House.

Both bookmobiles will make their runs in Washington County the week of November 27. The week of December 4, and part of the week of December 11 they will be in Chowan County. Response in all these counties has been most satisfactory. At the end of the month circulations for both bookmobiles will be published. It will be interesting to see whether Mrs. Alexander or Mrs. Harris will have circulated more books. People are again reminded that stops are not for one family only but for entire neighborhoods. It is not possible to stop at every house and it is the hope of planning committees that patrons will cooperate by using community stops. However, if there are people who cannot get to the bookmobiles, the bookmobiles will come to them. Stops may be requested by contacting local librarians.

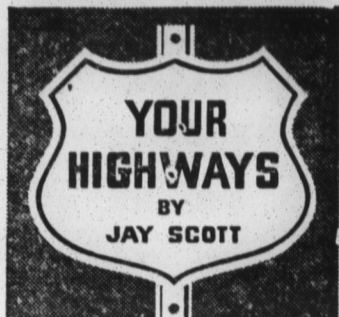

Especially For Pet Owners...

Dogs seldom develop cavities in their teeth, but they do have trouble with the formation of tartar. Tartar may cause inflammation and injury to the gums and eventually loosen the teeth. Veterinarians say teeth should be scaled regularly.

Infection of dogs with certain types of internal parasites can produce symptoms that are almost identical with canine distemper. Special treatment is required because drugs ordinarily used for worming pets are ineffective against this parasite.

People who keep rabbits as pets for children are advised to select a good, nutritious ration for the bunnies and to keep feeding it without sudden interruption or change. Abrupt changes of feed or feeding methods will invite trouble and possibly disease, the AVMA says.

New Convertible Will Await '56 Cotton Maid After Tour

A gleaming new Ford convertible will be awaiting the 1956 Maid of Cotton when she returns at the end of her six-month international tour next summer, the National Cotton Council has announced.

Judge J. C. Johnson, West Memphis, Ark., president of the Memphis District Ford Dealers advertising committee, has revealed that the dealer group will present the automobile to the cotton industry's fashion and good will ambassador.

The 1956 Maid of Cotton will be the tenth to be honored by the Ford dealers' group, Judge Johnson said that presentation of the car symbolizes the close working relationship between the cotton and automotive industries. The automobile industry is one of the largest consumers of cotton.

When contest finals are held December 28 at Memphis, the new Maid will receive a certificate of presentation and keys to her automobile. At the conclusion of her tour next summer, she will return to Memphis for a formal presentation of the car itself.

Contest Now On
The contest now is under way to choose the young lady who will serve the cotton industry as its eighteenth fashion and good will representative. Any girl born in a cotton producing state who is between the ages of 19-25, who has never been married, and who is at least 5 feet 5 inches tall is eligible to enter.

Entry forms and complete information are available from the Na-

tional Cotton Council, P. O. Box 9905, Memphis 12, Tennessee. All entries must be completed and returned postmarked no later than midnight December 1. Each entry must be accompanied by two recent photographs, one a head and shoulders portrait and the other full length.

Judging Standards

The Maid of Cotton competition is not a beauty contest in its usual sense, Cotton Council officials emphasize. Girls will be judged on the basis of personality, poise, and intelligence, as well as appearance. Immediately after the Maid is chosen, she will leave for New York for a month's preparatory training period and fittings of her glamorous cotton wardrobe designed by 40 fashion pacesetters. Her tour begins officially at Nassau, Bahamas, January 31 and will carry her to more than 30 cities in the United States and Canada. Plans for a European tour will be announced shortly, the Cotton Council added.

Each year the contest and tour are sponsored by the National Cotton Council, the Memphis Cotton Carnival, and the Cotton Exchange of Memphis, New York, and New Orleans.

Vets' Question Box

Q—If I buy a house with a GI loan, I understand I will have to make a down payment of two per cent. Does the lender have any

right to ask for a larger down payment?

A—Yes. The lender has the right to request a larger down payment than the two per cent minimum.

Q—I have just been discharged from service, and I intend to apply to VA for disability compensation. Will I be required to take a VA physical examination?

A—Not necessarily. If you file a claim within six months from the date of your separation, it may be

rated initially based on the records of the service department, unless it appears that an error might result from such a rating.

Q—Are VA's special "wheelchair housing" grants available only to disabled World War II and Korea veterans?

A—No. Veterans of all wars, as well as those with peacetime service only, may qualify, so long as they meet the eligibility requirements of the law.

Q—I am a disabled Korea veter-

eran. What is my deadline for applying for the special GI insurance available to disabled Korea veterans?

A—You must apply and pay your first premium within one year from the date that VA has determined your disability to be service-connected.
