

SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS

The first V-type ditch in Chowan County was dug on Nolan Toppin's farm in Rocky Hook community last week. This ditch was dug by a special type dragline bucket and can only be dug for field ditches. This bucket has a 15-inch bottom, 3/4 by 1 side slope and is about 3 feet in height. With a 3/4 by 1 side slope a ditch 3 feet deep will be 5 feet across the top of the newly dug ditch. One of the main complaints of the dragline ditch among farmers is that the ditches are too wide and costly to be used to drain fields. This new type of ditch has a narrow top width and the cost is about 30 cents per "running yard."

Maynard Fleetwood is digging these ditches with his new dragline and the first ditch he cut cost about 28 1/2 cents per linear yard. It is hoped that with more experience with the new bucket that the cost can be lowered some. Mr. Fleetwood is working on John F. White's farm in Paradise community. By Thursday of this week he should be on Wallace Goodwin's farm in Paradise. Go by and see these V-type ditches. An estimation of the cost of these ditches can be given to anyone desiring it. Come by the Soil Conservation Service office in the post office building for an estimation of your job.

A petition has been received from the landowners on Coffield Lane ditch to help them with a drainage project in their community. Coffield Lane ditch runs beside the paved road in Paradise from H. V. Bass' land to the Green Hall road and into Pembroke Creek. A survey will be made soon on this project.

A Lane group ditch survey has been completed and the notes are at the SCS engineer's office for design and approval. A meeting can probably be held very soon.

An engineer survey was started Monday on Middleton Swamp at Yeopim Road. This is a part of the mosquito control project.

The Chowan County Soil Conservation District supervisors have agreed to furnish technical help to both the Town of Edenton and to the Chowan County Commissioners on their mosquito control projects. The Chowan County Supervisors are Lloyd C. Bunch, R. H. Hollowell and Joe A. Webb, Jr. An engineering survey has been made on the Town of Edenton. The cost estimation for recommended improve-

ments was given the Town Clerk last week. More work will be done on the project as needed. An engineering survey was started on Middleton Creek Monday and should be completed in about a week. All the main creeks and streams in the county have been looked over for possible mosquito control work by the Soil Conservation Service engineer and other SCS personnel. Mosquito control work was started on Pembroke Creek about three weeks ago.

Lennie Harrell has made complete conservation farm plans on the three farms he is operating. First, all the land was mapped according to type and placed in land classes. The farm planner then walked over the land with Mr. Harrell and planned it according to its needs as shown by the land classification. Tile was planned on part of the land while wildlife borders were planned beside the woods. A complete rotation was worked out returning as much vegetables to the soil as possible each year. Cro-talaria was planned on some of the sandy soils as a soil building crop and cover crops were planned for about two-thirds of the cropland. New pasture was planned on some of the wetter bottoms. These are some of the things that are planned in the complete conservation farm plan.

Six inch tile can be bought for 14 1/2 cents per foot delivered to the farm by truck. A truck load is 2,600 feet but more than one order can be placed on one truck provided the farmers desire this arrangement. Eaten farmer will get delivery on his farm as if he has a truck load of tile. It is planned to get a tile machine in the county if enough farmers are interested in tile. It is necessary that the Soil Conservation Service personnel know your plans to get the tile machine and the tile. Tile is approved for ACP payment during 1956. Let's make our plans now and begin work on the tile. We need it here.

Superior Court Gets Started Day Late

tween indictments and presentments and the method of acting on each. About presentments, he said it is almost impossible for the law to be violated without some member of the grand jury knowing something about it and that it is the duty of a juror to report it. In this connection he also emphasized the importance of absolute secrecy of what transpires in the grand jury deliberations, and that nothing should be divulged after leaving the grand jury room.

He told the grand jury that the Statutes provide for an inspection of the county home and jail, but while it is not mandatory, the custom is also to inspect all county affairs as well as school buses.

While the grand jury was considering bills of indictment Judge Fountain dissolved a restraining order preventing B. W. Evans, president of the Edenton Veneer Mill from hiring employees due to non-payment of social security payments. The dissolution of the restraining order was dependent upon Mr. Evans paying the sum of \$1,000 at once to be applied to \$3,684.72 delinquent social security payments and his willingness and ability to pay current contributions and \$400 per month on the unpaid delinquent amount. In addition he was ordered to pay court costs and reminded that if he fails to make monthly payments the restraining order will be in full force and effect.

The first case tried involved Willie Morris, John Stallings, John Hardy, Moses Wilder and Dan Bond, charged with stealing hogs from the farm of West Byrum. Each was sentenced to four months on the roads, suspended upon paying court costs and \$3.20 each to Raleigh Leary, as well as showing good behaviour for two years.

On another charge of hog stealing Stallings and Wilder were found not guilty, but the other three were sentenced to three months, suspended upon paying court costs and \$10.75 to Desoto Hardie. They must also show good behaviour for two years.

George Welch was found guilty of drunken driving, reckless driving, possession of non-tax-paid whiskey and transporting. He pleaded not guilty, but at the conclusion of the state's evidence he entered a plea of guilty. He was sentenced to six months on the roads, suspended upon payment of a fine of \$150, court costs and showing good behaviour for two years. He is also forbidden to operate a motor vehicle until he has received a valid license.

R. D. Albertson pleaded guilty to writing a worthless check, but Judge Fountain had not passed sentence up to recessing court Tuesday.

Joe P. Brower, Jr., pleaded not guilty to a charge of drunken driving and this case was being tried when court recessed late Tuesday afternoon.
