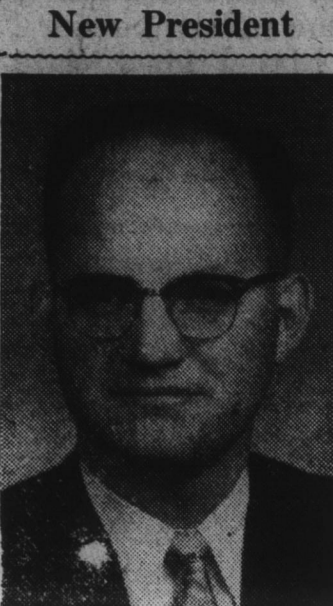

She gave information on how to condition flowers. The women were advised to cut the flowers, put them in water and set them in a cool, dark place for three hours before arranging them. Mrs. Flynn stressed the importance of using simple containers. Those present discussed the use of foliage and were advised to use pine, spruce, and other native greenery.

An inspirational devotional was given by Mrs. Cora Harrell.

The business session was conducted by Mrs. H. T. Hollowell, Council President. She spoke briefly on radio programs and news articles for which the clubs are responsible. She urged the clubs to send their contribution to the State Music Fund.
