**Effie Matalon Tells Rotarians About Greece**

Edenton Rotarians enjoyed a rather unique program at last Thursday's meeting when the speaker was Miss Effie Matalon, a Greek Rotary exchange student now enrolled at Duke University.

At the outset Miss Matalon expressed the belief that better international relations result from the exchange student program and of her pleasure and honor to be able to come to America to study. She is majoring in psychology.

Miss Matalon briefly explained the geographical structure of Greece, saying it was about the size of North Carolina, but double the population. She also told of living conditions in Greece, referring to them as very bad during the German occupation, and giving credit to America for its help in subduing the guerrillas.
