

PASTURE SUGGESTIONS

From what we have seen so far this year, Ladino Clover and Clover Grass pastures are beginning to look quite good. But, we must remember that pastures have to be fed in order to give maximum food for livestock.

If your pasture hasn't already been top-dressed, you should do so at once, using 500 pounds of 0-10-20 per acre unless your soil test stated otherwise. Pastures should not be grazed until they are four to six inches high and then not too closely.

April and early May is the time when bloat appears. Watch your animals for bloat. Feed your cattle and sheep plenty of hay before turning them on the pasture and this will help greatly toward avoiding the trouble.

In case you observe an animal that is bloating, there is something you can do. Take a stick, preferably a rough or square stick about two inches in size and about 10 or 12 inches long. Fasten a rope to one end securely, place the stick in the animal's mouth crosswise, run the rope around the head of the animal and fasten it securely on the other end of the stick so as to hold the stick well up in the animal's mouth. Usually this will induce chewing and licking and start the

animal to regurgitate. In severe cases or in case this doesn't seem to take care of the situation in five or ten minutes, call your veterinarian.

In pastures where the cover is predominantly grass apply nitrogen at the rate of approximately 32 pounds of actual nitrogen per acre. This will start the grass off to a quick growth and give you more early grass. Such an application may be made every 30 to 60 days as needed.

The wet weather has prevented many growers seeding pastures this spring as intended. Ladino Clover sown now or as soon as the soil is workable, should still do all right this season. Otherwise, the land might be sown to some other crop for a summer grazing and the pasture sown next fall.

Star millet is a good grass crop to sow particularly on lighter soil types for summer grazing. Fertilize the soil broadcast with 500 pounds of 8-8-8 fertilized working it into the soil. Broadcast 20 to 25 pounds of same per acre. Then run a pea weeder sufficiently to cover the seed. Star millet must be grazed sufficiently to keep it young and tender. An application of 30 pounds of nitrogen every six weeks will give additional grazing.

Carrots Get The Nod From Nutritionists

There's something to the old remedy of eating carrots to improve eyesight. Carrots get the nod from nutritionists for their bountiful supply of carotene which your bodies can change into vitamin A—known as the "good eyesight" vitamin.

According to Ruby P. Uzzle, Extension Service consumer marketing specialist at State College, a serving of cooked carrots is more concentrated than an equal size serving of raw carrots, thus it can give more vitamin A. Mrs. Uzzle explains that one-half cup serving of either raw or cooked carrots supplies well over the amount of vitamin A recommended for the daily diet of the 25-year-old man. "Few foods surpass carrots in providing vitamin A either in quantity or in economy," she continues.

Many varieties of carrots are found on the markets. The shorter carrots with blunt ends may be as tender as the long, slender varieties. The intended use and the price tag may influence your choice.

What does the color have to do with the quality of carrots? The orange color is a measure of the carotene or vitamin A content of carrots—those of bright orange color probably furnish more vitamin A than carrots less bright in color. The color can be affected by:

The location of the growing area, variety, storage conditions, and age of the root and other environmental factors.

Mrs. Uzzle hastens to point out, however, that the orange color is not a true indication of sweetness and flavor. More mature carrots will likely be a brighter orange than small ones, but they will not be as tender. They may be a good choice for stews and pot roasts, while young, tender carrots of smaller size and lighter in color may be preferred for salads or relish trays.

IN "OPERATION FROSTY"

RECORD SOYBEAN ACREAGE

March 1 prospective acreage of soybeans grown alone for all purposes is estimated at a record 543,000 acres and is 10 per cent larger than the 1956 acreage, according to the N. C. Crop Reporting Service. If the prospective plantings are carried out the acreage will exceed the previous record 1943 alone acreage by 48,000 acres. The current crop is expected to be 39 per cent above the 1946-55 ten-year average of 392,000 acres.

BEEES NEED FOOD

Beekeepers should examine their colonies of bees carefully and be sure they have enough feed for good brood rearing, according to County Agent C. W. Overman. Some colonies examined last week were found to be low in food and will have to be fed to survive.

The cool damp and rainy weather for the last 60 days has permitted very few days for good bee flight and food collection. Brood rearing has been moving forward in

the meantime. Some colonies will need feeding to tide them over until the main honey flow gets under way.

KNOW YOUR SOCIAL SECURITY

How does farm rental income affect eligibility for social security? Starting with 1956, farm rental income counts for social security if in accordance with the rental arrangement the landlord materially participates in the production or management of the production of the farm commodities on his land. Rental income received by a landowner who does not materially participate continues to be excluded from social security coverage.

Perhaps you are wondering, just exactly what is material participation. The following tests will help you decide whether you are materially participating. You must have an arrangement for participating, either oral or in writing, and you must meet one of the tests as follows: Test No. 1—Advance, pay or stand good for at least one half the direct cost of producing the crop; furnish at least one half the tools, equipment and livestock used in producing the crop; Advise and consult with your tenant periodically; or inspect the production activities periodically. (If you do any three of the four things above named, test No. 1 will be met). Test No. 2—Regularly and frequently make, or take an important part in making management decisions substantially contributing to or affecting the success of the enterprise. Test No. 3—Work 100 hours or more spread over a period of 5 weeks or more in activities connected with producing the crop. Test No. 4. If you do things which, considered in their total effect, show you are materially and significantly involved in the production of the farm commodities. Such situations as well as any cases that are otherwise doubtful may be submitted to the Norfolk Office of the Social Security Administration or the Internal Revenue Service for a decision. After you retire and are qualified for monthly benefits and materially participate in the operation of your farm, your farm rental income must be counted in your yearly earnings under the retirement test.
