The entire division, which is commanded by Major General Claude T. Bowers of Warrenton, will be at Fort Bragg, except for the armored and anti-aircraft elements which will train at Camp Stewart, Ga., in August.

Training for the local Heavy Mortar Company has become more intense as the time for camp approached, according to Captain Cecil W. Fry, commanding officer, who said the 15-day active duty period is the climax of the year's work for local Guardsmen.

Highlight of the first week of camp will be the divisional parade Saturday, June 15, when the

entire division will pass in review. The division will move into the field on Monday of the second week where five days of the training period will be spent on the west ranges with the artillery and infantry of the division battling simulated aggressor forces.

The division will return to the R.T.C. area of Fort Brag on Friday, June 21. Saturday will be payday for the Guardsmen who draw regular army pay for the 15 days of training.
