ASC Office Will Be Polling Place For **Chowan County**

As a last-minute reminder, A. C. Griffin, chairman of the Chowan County ASC Committee, the attention of wheat growers to the referendum on wheat marketing quotas to be held on Thursday, June 20.

The voting place for Chowar

County farmers to vote will be at the ASC office, where ballots may be cast from 8 A. M., to 7 P. M. The Soil Bank program has caused a slight change in the eligibility rule for voting from what has been in effect in past referendums, Chairman Griffin stated The rule as it now stands is that all persons are eligibel to vote in the June 20 referendum who will share in the 1958 wheat crop from a farm on which the wheat acreage to be harvested, plus any wheat acreage to be put in the wheat Acreage Reserve, will be

Two-thirds or more of the eligible voters must approve quotas in order to put them into effect on the 1958 wheat crop.


