Penman J. Wood from Maryland. They were on their way to Florida, and I guess they just could not resist stopping here for a few days to see their new grandchild.

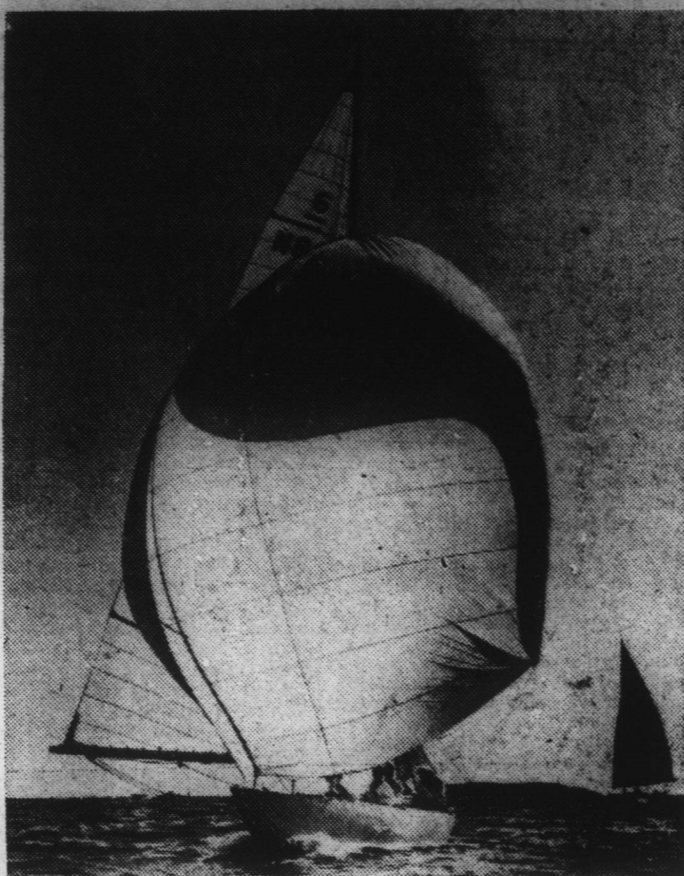
Lt. and Mrs. Art Long entertained a visitor, too, Bob Christian of Richmond, Va.

The payment of bills since the last meeting were read, and approved, by a motion made and duly passed as follows:

Veterans Training program, \$802.55; Teacherage, \$37.80; Instructional Services, \$509.17; Cur-

rent Expense, \$981.80; total, \$2,331.32.

Representatives from the Pilot Life Insurance Company, the Walker Insurance Agency, and the Nationwide Mutual Insurance Company, presented their scholastic insurance plans for the schools for the 1957-58 term. After due consideration, a motion was made and duly passed, authorizing the acceptance of the Pilot Life Insurance plan for \$1.25 per student premium.

The superintendent presented the report of the District Committee in the election of certain teachers as follows: For Grammar grade work at Chowan High School, Mrs. Edna Wilkins Reaves and Mrs. Shirley Alford Layton, for English and French. For

both Elementary and Grammar grade work in the White Oak Consolidated School, Sarah M. Everett, Mary Frances Bowser, and Dorothy Walker. The action of the Committee was adopted by a motion made and unanimously passed.

Motion was made and duly passed, authorizing the superintendent to advertise for bids on the construction of the proposed Sewage Disposal Plant for Chowan High School.

By motion made and duly passed authorizing the superintendent to have plans and specifications made for four additional classrooms at Chowan High School, and to advertise for bids as soon as plans and specifications had been approved.

A motion was made and adopted that all selling and station activities by students should be done before and during the regular school hours.

Vets' Question Box

Q—I am a disabled Korea veteran taking vocational rehabilitation training. Will my monthly subsistence allowance end as soon as I am declared rehabilitated?

A—No. It will go on for two months after you are declared rehabilitated.

Q—I have a World War II GI term insurance policy. If I needed a loan, could I borrow on this policy?

A—No. World War I GI term insurance has no borrowing value. However, your World War II term policy may be converted to

permanent insurance, which does begin to build up a loan value after it has been in force one year.

Q—I am eligible for War Orphans schooling. I am living with my mother who is planning to take a Government job in a foreign country. Could I go to college in the foreign country under the War Orphans program?

A—The law specifies that War Orphans schooling must be taken in an educational institution only in the United States or its possessions. That rules out a foreign country.
