

Electric Co-op Holds Annual Meet Sept. 14

A. T. Lane, President of the Albemarle Electric Membership Corporation, announces the 10th annual meeting of the Corporation will be held in Hertford Saturday, September 14.

All members of the corporation are urged to attend the meeting and participate in the selection of directors and other activity scheduled on the program.

Members will select nine directors for the corporation and nominated for the posts are J. A. Whitehurst and Joe W. Hastings, Camden County; John N. Bunch and J. A. Wiggins, Chowan County; A. T. Lane, Charles E. White, Floyd Mathews, Ellis Winslow, Perquimans County; W. R. Lowry and J. A. Spence, of Pasquotank County.

Mr. Lane reports a continuing growth of the Cooperative in both members receiving electric service and uses by them. He points out that they are now serving over 2700 members, with total annual use of 9,798,476 KWH of electricity.

Mr. Lane also states that the Cooperative is at present employing 13 full time employees with an annual payroll of \$45,000.00.

President Lane states that much planning for future expansion has been made and promises that the Cooperative will meet the increasing demands for electric service in the Albemarle area as it continues to progress.

Sunday School Lesson

EZEKIEL, PASTOR OF HIS PEOPLE

International Sunday School Lesson For September 15, 1957.

Memory Selection "Blessed is the nation whose God is the Lord." —Psalms 33:12.

About the year 597 B. C., the Babylonians carried into exile the largest and most influential group of Jewish captives, among them being King Jehoiachin and the prophet, Ezekiel, who was destined to become the foremost prophet and religious leader of the exile.

While we do not know much about Ezekiel, it is believed that he was of high rank, the son of a priest and probably trained to be a religious leader. Ezekiel ranks with the great prophets of the Old Testament, and is regarded by many as the father of latter-day Judaism.

While the life of the Jewish people, as exiles, was not particularly burdensome, they naturally longed for the time to come when they could return to their own land and to their beloved Jerusalem. For a time, there was a spirit of optimism among them, believing that the dire prophecies of Jeremiah would not be fulfilled, and they would soon be able to return home.

However, when the news came to them that Jerusalem had been

completely destroyed, and with it the Temple had been demolished, the people realized the truth of the prophet's warnings and the teachings of Ezekiel, and were convinced, finally, that because of their sins against God, they were being punished.

Even though he knew his messages were very unpopular with the people and were often preached to wilfully deaf ears, Ezekiel continued to deliver the messages which he received from God himself. These messages were not such as to give pleasure to his hearers, Ezekiel had the courage to say the things he believed God wanted him to say.

God had set him up as a watchman to the people, to deliver warnings to them in a time of danger—even though they didn't want to be warned. So, today, God warns his people of the dangers which follow their drifting away from him, their failure to obey his laws and of following their own pleasures and desires.

Ezekiel felt deeply his responsibility as a spokesman for God. His was the task of warning the children of Israel of the grave consequences of their sins. Although his was the task of warning, his was not the guilt if they failed to heed his words.

J. H. Jowett declares: "We have not always to indulge in quieting words of comfort; we are to use the clarion, and arouse

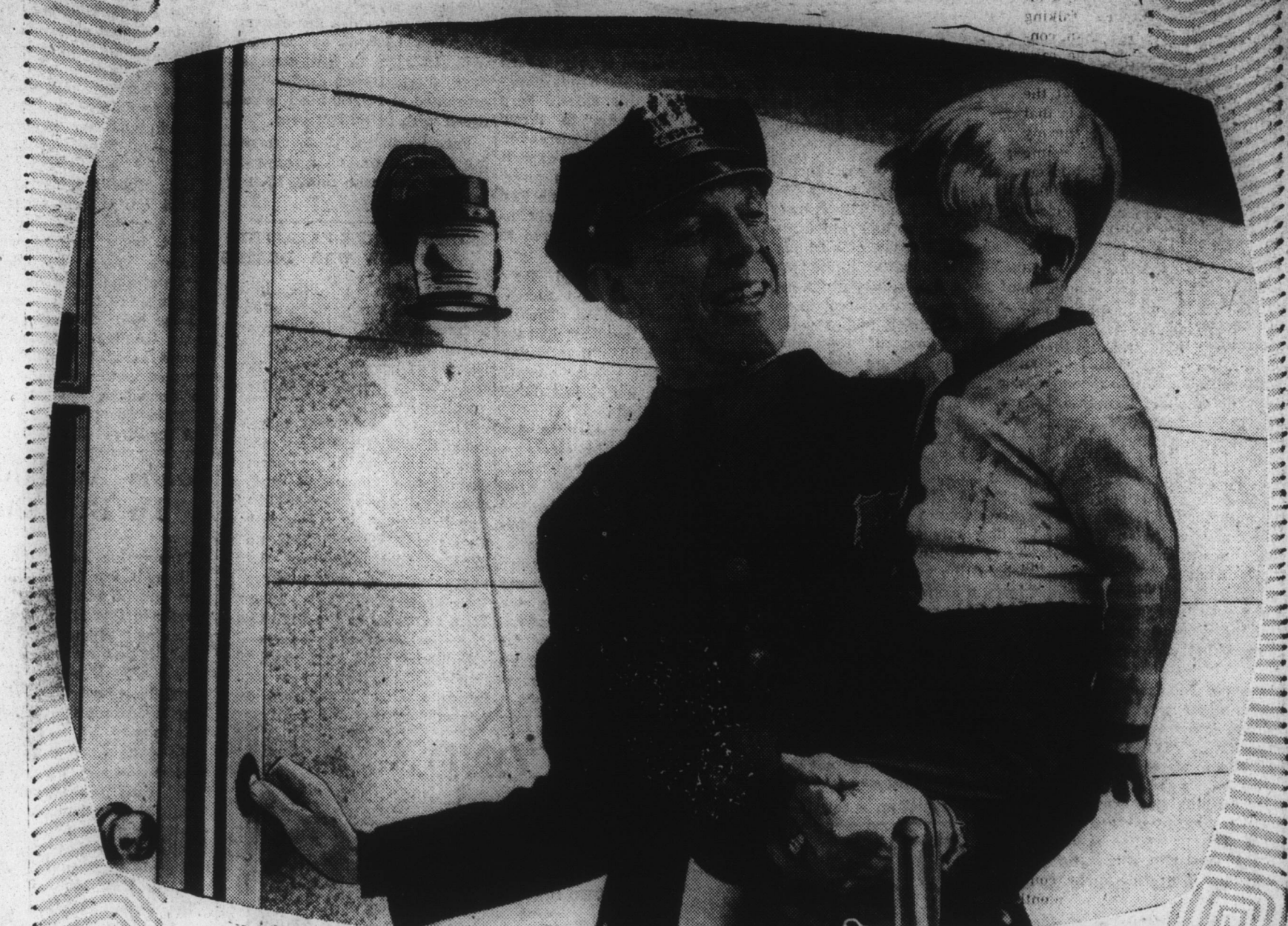
