She stated that the quota last year was 11,000 members but the state fell short. This year, she said, the quota is 10,247 and that the entire year will be devoted to efforts to increase the membership.

Mrs. Chestnutt issued a challenge to the Legionnaires to reach the quota, though the Auxiliary has just about reached its quota She emphasized the importance of having more members and said women can be happy in doing work in the Auxiliary.
