Introductions were made by the principal speaker, Dr. Barker directed his remarks principally to handicapped children of the state. He said there was a great deal of concern about children who need different kinds of education, some with physical and others with mental handicaps. He pointed out the need for crippled children, children whose speech is a handicap, the visually handicapped, those hard of hearing and the biggest problem, the mentally retarded children.

He pointed out that many of the latter group are not able to keep up with normal children, but that they are periodically moved up and in some instances when they reach the compulsory attendance age they cannot even read.

Dr. Barker said special class room and teachers with special skills are needed to correct the situation, and that at present there are 33 classes set up in the state with 370 children in attendance.

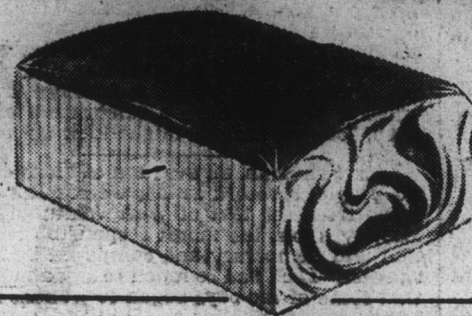
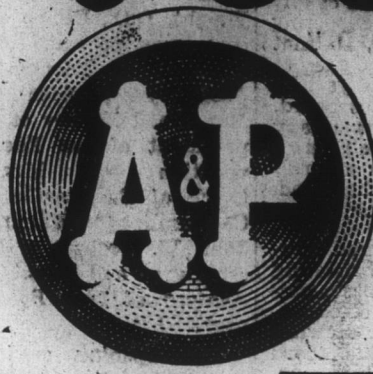
