Washington — Senator Long of Louisiana has introduced a bill, which I have co-sponsored, that would allow World War II and Korean War veterans who failed to take out National Service Life Insurance when they were eligible for it, or who let it lapse later, take advantage of the program now.

The bill would give a second chance to thousands of veterans to obtain up to \$10,000 life insurance under the government sponsored insurance program for servicemen and veterans.

Thousands of wartime veterans didn't take out this insurance while they were in service because of financial reasons or because of no family responsibilities. Senator Long's bill would open up the program for a period of one year and give these veterans another opportunity to take advantage of it.

I think this would be an effective way to offer assistance to a large group of veterans who mistakenly or unknowingly did not take part in the program or who let their policies expire when they left service.

Furthermore, such a bill if it is enacted into law, would not cost the taxpayers any money. The cost of administering it would be absorbed in premiums paid by the veterans themselves.

At the same time, it would mean that these veterans, who are certainly entitled to take part in the program, could get life insurance coverage at a relatively low cost compared with the cost of private insurance.

Senator Long has estimated it

will mean at least a 20 per cent savings on policies of \$10,000. On two previous occasions, similar legislation has been approved by the Senate, but both times failed to get House and Senate concurrence.

This year, a total of 55 Senators joined with Senator Long in sponsoring the legislation. For this reason, it would appear that chances are very good for such a proposal being enacted into law.

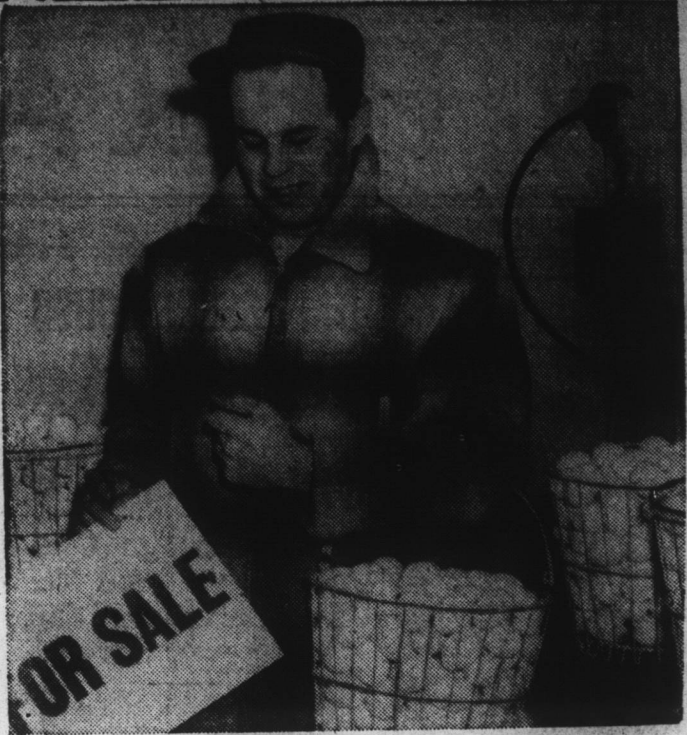

Vets' Question Box

Q—About a year ago, I told VA to hold the dividends on my GI insurance to my credit. If I do not pay the quarterly premium due next month, will the VA deduct it from those dividend credits?

A—No. VA is not permitted to withdraw a quarterly premium from your dividend credit without your written consent. The VA, however, will withdraw monthly premiums to keep your insurance from lapsing.

Q—The VA recently liberalized its regulations affecting veterans whose schooling had been interrupted, and permitted re-entry on training in many cases. Does anything in this liberalization apply to a student expelled for misconduct.

A—No. If Korean GI training

is interrupted or discontinued for misconduct, and the school refuses to readmit the veteran, the law denies him all further GI training.
