Minutes Of Board Of Public Works

Edenton, N. C., July 24, 1959. Special meeting of the Board of Public Works, on call of Mr. Thomas Byrum, Chairman, was held at 8:00 P. M., Monday at the Edenton Municipal Building; the following members present: Mr. Thomas Byrum, Chairman, Mr. Jesse Harrell, Mr. Ralph Ricks, Jr., Mr. Jimmie Ricks, Jr.

This meeting was called to discuss the possibility of rendering water, sewer, and electric service to Seabrook Water Licensing Co., 1262 Logan Ave., Tyne, Va., at the following locations:

1. Edenton Development Corp., site, U. S. 17 North, Edenton, N. C.
 2. Albemarle Peanut Co., site, Badham Road, Edenton, N. C.
 3. Halsey Hardware Co., site, Boer's Lane, Edenton, N. C.
- Mr. Jesse Harrell reported to the board that Mr. James H. Gardner, president of the above mentioned company advised him that his requirements of water would be 50 gal. per min. @ 60 lb pressure and that his peak waste would amount to approximately 72,000 gals. per 24 hour period.
- On motion by Mr. Jesse Harrell, seconded by Mr. Jimmie Ricks, Jr., and carried, Chairman Byrum was authorized and requested to write a letter to Mr. James H. Gardner, president of the above mentioned company advising him of available water, sewer and electric services at the above mentioned sites; the contents of that letter to become a part of these minutes.

Edenton, N. C., Aug. 4, 1959. The Board of Public Works met this day in regular session at 8:00 P. M., at the Edenton Municipal Building. Members present: Thomas C. Byrum, Chairman, Jesse L. Harrell, Ralph E. Parrish, James P. Ricks, Jr.

The minutes of the regular meeting of July 7th, and special meetings of July 13th, and July 24th were approved as read.

Chairman Byrum recognized Mr. J. E. Buffap and Mr. Bill Bunch, members of the Town Council, who requested the Board of Public Works to furnish an estimate of costs involved to furnish the first section of the M. G. Brown Company, Inc., proposed subdivision, (first section being approximately 13 building lots) sewage and water. Chairman Byrum informed Mr. Buffap and Bunch that the estimated costs would approximate \$13,500.00 exclusive of the cost of furnishing and installing necessary sewage pumping station. In the discussion, the fact was brought out that if the entire area of the proposed M. G. Brown Company, Inc., subdivision would be planned at one and the same time it would be quite possible that the proposed pumping station which the Board of Public Works plans to install in the vicinity of the Edenton Marina could serve the entire area, therefore, making it unnecessary to install pumping station on the Brown property.

Chairman Byrum read letter dated July 14th that he directed to Mr. Ray L. Goodman, vice president, Virginia Electric & Power Company requesting additional power line source for Edenton, and then read Mr. Ray L. Goodman's answer to that letter dated July 21st, and directed that both of these letters become a part of the minutes of this meeting.

July 14, 1959

Dear Mr. Goodman: You are no doubt aware of the fact that on June 30, 1959, Edenton and this entire section, was without electric power from 1:15 P. M., to 4:40 P. M., due to storm damage to your company's 110 KV line between Suffolk, Va., and Winfall, N. C.

Your attention is respectfully directed to our letter of May 9, 1950 in connection with a power failure on May 5, 1950. We wrote again on July 3, 1952 concerning a similar outage. Our records, which are certainly incomplete, show that since September 4, 1950 there have been fourteen (14) interruptions of service to this community and area which lasted more than an hour, some of them as much as five (5) hours.

In view of the operational experience your company has had, trying to maintain service to an area as large as this, with only one main feeder line, it seems that your efforts should be directed toward the installation of an additional power line source for this section, having an exposure to storm some distance from the present facility.

We, therefore, respectfully urge you to make a concentrated effort in this direction and will

be grateful for any information concerning your progress.

Dear Mr. Byrum: I wish to acknowledge and thank you for your letter of July 14, 1959, in which you discussed the service outage which occurred on Tuesday afternoon, June 30, and also our plans concerning an additional source of supply to your area.

A second 110 KV. line is to be constructed from our Portsmouth Power Station through Hickory to Elizabeth City, closing the loop with the Suffolk-Winfall-Elizabeth City line thereby providing additional capacity to meet the economic growth of the area and a higher degree of reliability of service. This line has been included in our future plans for several years. In fact, our studies had indicated the need for the completion of this line during 1961 and, therefore, provision for the construction was included in our 1959 budget and the project was authorized on March 31, 1959.

We realized that at the time of authorization that it would be necessary to start engineering promptly in order to have this line in service in 1961. Therefore, we proceeded immediately, and, to date, have complete preliminary field studies, secured aerial photographs of the entire route of the line, and drawn in the approximate location of the line on the aerial photographs.

On July 7, 1959, engineers were instructed to begin the actual field survey of the line and preparation of property plats for right of way acquisition. Our plans call for construction to follow promptly, with completion planned for as early in 1961 as practicable.

Upon receiving your letter of July 14, we reviewed our record of service interruptions to Edenton from 1953 to the present time and find that, in this twenty-two-year period, there have been twelve interruptions of over one hour and ten interruptions ranging from five to fifty minutes. These numbers do not include eight interruptions of over one hour and two of lesser time, which were arranged for to make changes and improvements to the circuit.

We are aware fully of our obligation to render service with the highest degree of reliability consistent with sound business principles. We agree readily that the load in this general area is increasing to the point where steps should be taken to improve the capacity and reliability.

A program to accomplish this had already been undertaken before the recent interruptions, as stated above, and we are confident the result will meet this goal.

Mr. A. H. McDowell, Jr. On motion by Ralph Parrish, seconded by Jesse Harrell and carried, Superintendent H. N. Rines was requested to make a study of power used for electric water heating, time clock operation, and rates, and report his findings at the next board meetings.

Ralph Parrish made report as requested at the meeting of July 13th regarding electric service to the Robbins Motel, RFD, Edenton. Parrish reported that service to this customer by the Town of Edenton would, under present regulations, cost the customer approximately \$160.00; whereas, the Albemarle Electric Membership Corporation gave this service for \$14.00 even though they were required to run about 1/2 mile of new line to give the service. The prospective user expressed the idea that he would rather be served by the Town of Edenton but that the cost differential forced him to go to Albemarle Electric Membership Corporation instead of Edenton for this service.
