To illustrate this point Smith showed two advertisements from the Wall Street Journal and the New York Times' supplement from towns in Pennsylvania and Florida. The Pennsylvania town advertised 100% financing.

Mr. Smith discussed various activities that Chambers of Commerce are engaged in, but stated that some of them were not being done in Edenton because of money or manpower shortage, since the present manpower is being used in behalf of new industry. He pointed out that the Chamber of Commerce was financed by its members in Edenton and Chowan County. Membership is \$25 per unit, and many industries purchase multiple units. Membership is also neld by professional people and retired people who are interestd in Edenton. The present budget, he stated, is \$11,790, vhich is the lowest figure on, which the Chamber can operte The attention of the Champer is centered on four activiies, Smith pointed out, these beng industrial development, toursts, retail and general business mprovements and special proects. Industry at present is the nost important activity. This s a vital goal since industry is needed to balance a flourishing gricultural activity. An indus-'ry is a prime source for "new money" since it represents the increase in the value of a raw material being processed with ourchase of the finished product oming from outside the area.
