Wheat Referendum Passes In Nation

Final results of the July 23 referendum in the 39-State commercial wheat-producing area show that 80.8 percent of the 210,187 farmers voting favored marketing quotas for the 1960 wheat crop. The vote was 169,760 for and 40,427 against.

The final favorable percentage is only slightly higher than the preliminary figure of 80.7 percent favorable announced July 24th.

Since the wheat marketing quotas have been approved by more than the necessary two-thirds of the farmers voting in the referendum, the quotas will be in effect for the 1960 wheat crop.

The vote in the 1960-crop referendum marks the ninth time farmers have voted favorably on marketing quotas for wheat.
