More than 150,000 grade school boys throughout the United States have registered for the "Punt, Pass and Kick" program which is being conducted during the current football season under the joint sponsorship of the Ford Division of Ford Motor Company. The local contest is sponsored by the Albemarle Motor Company.

The program's objective is to create interest in sports and physical fitness among American youngsters by giving them a chance to test their skill in punting, passing and place-kicking a football in competition with other youths of their age. The boys, aged 8 to 10, will be competing for prizes that will include, for the national winner in each age bracket, a trip with their dads to the National Football League's championship game late in December and a visit to the White House.

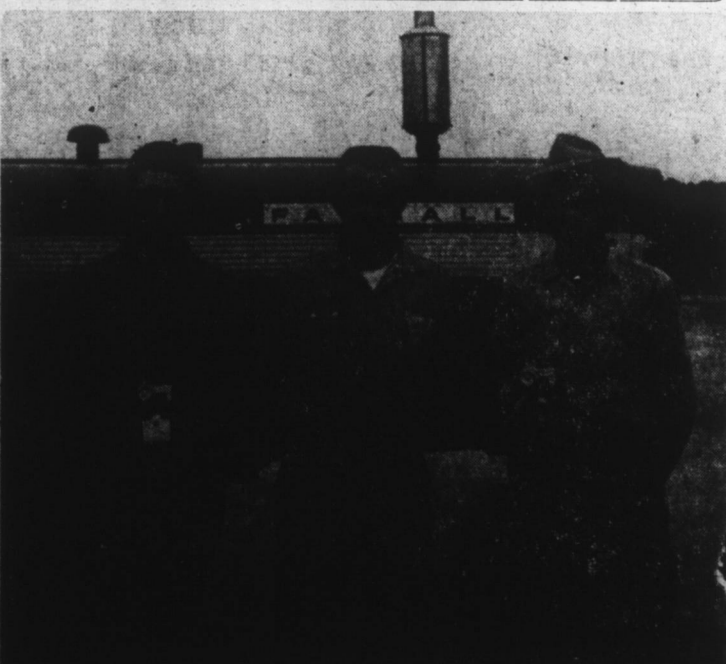
Homecoming Royalty Will Be Crowned at Half Time By Pat Lane, 1960 Queen
