## One Of Best Seasons Reported For N. C. Commercial Fishermen

North Carolina commercial fishermen experienced one of their best seasons during the past winter and spring in catches of finfish.

This will be reported by C. G. Holland, State Fisheries Commissioner, to the State Board of Conservation and Development at its summer meeting in Boone, July 8-10.

Holland says in his report that catches of bluefish, wackerel, mullet, flounder, spots, trout, sea mullet, and hogfish were good during the past spring.

Shrimp catches for the first six months of 1962 amounted to 143,656 pounds, or 758 pounds more than the corresponding period in 1961.

Holland said the Institute of Fisheries Research, a unit of the University of North Carolina at Morehead City, is stepping up its research program on shrimp and that recommendations for improving this segment of the fishing industry are expected. The board's commercial fisheries committee has recommended the institute be given \$10,000 from a special 1961 appropriation for research on shrimp.

There has been a decline in production of clams and the Institute of Fisheries Research has been asked to find out why. There was a decline in catches of soft and hard crabs. The commercial fisheries committee

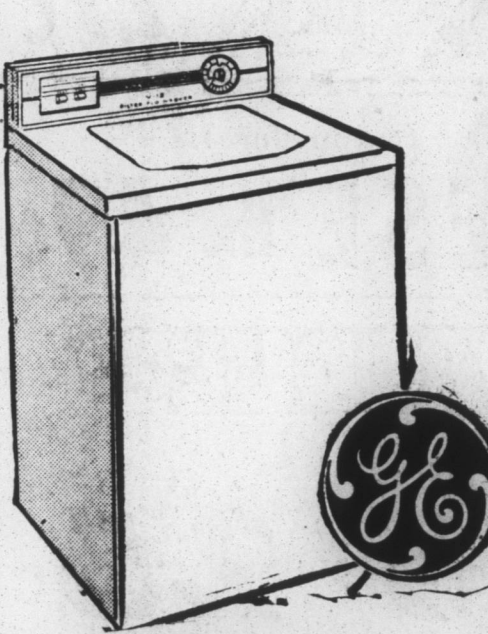

Teachers for this week will be Jean Goodwin, Sandra Bunch and Pat Penny. All children between the ages of five and eight years are invited to attend.

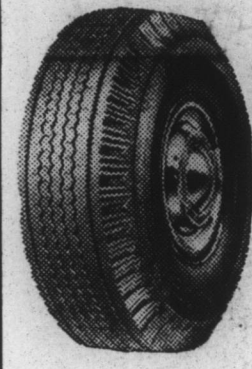
