



SOCIAL SECURITY
Questions and Answers

George Dietrich, field representative of the Social Security Administration, is in Edenton every Thursday at the North Carolina Employment Security Commission office on North Broad Street.

Q—I applied for benefits when my son was laid off, and I turned my farm over to him. Now he's been called back to work, and I'll have to operate the farm. My earnings will be much higher than I expected. What should I do?

A—Submit an estimate of your revised earnings to your payment center. A special post card is available from your local social security office for this purpose.

Q—What's the sense of filing an estimate of earnings? I'm a salesman, and I never know for sure how much I've made until the year's over. Why can't you just withhold future benefits if I make too much?

A—A primary purpose of social security is to replace partly the income that is lost because of retirement. The key to your question is "future benefits." We have 15 million people on our benefit rolls and know from experience that when you are eligible for benefits you need them. When your earned income is down, and if you're not receiving your social security, you can know real hardship.

Q—I don't see much reason for filing an estimate of earnings. Isn't "estimate" just a fancy word for "guess"?

A—If you like. We recognize that people aren't going to be able to tell how much they'll make to the penny. That's why we have an annual report at the end of the year. However, who is better able to estimate what you'll earn than yourself? One purpose of estimating your earnings is to give you flexibility. Benefits are paid on a monthly basis while your earnings are totaled by the year. Estimates

enable you to have your monthly income based on your own good judgment of your earning potential.

The public is invited to attend this show and sale. The pullets will be judged and auctioned off by W. G. Andrews, Extension poultry specialist from N. C. State College in Raleigh. Judging will begin at 2 P. M., and the sale will begin at 2:30. Everyone is invited to bid on and buy these pullets. It is a good chance for buying replacements for small family-size flocks and a wonderful opportunity to support a very worthwhile 4-H Club activity.
