

SENATOR Sam Ervin SAYS

Washington — Congress, which convened this year on January 11, is expected to conclude its work either this week or early next week. Conference bills on Trade, Drug Controls, Tax Revision, and Self-employed Retirement Tax Deductions are likely to be passed by Congress in the final days of the session. A Postal Revision-Employees Pay bill may be approved by both Houses prior to adjournment.

Congressional approval of most legislative measures this session centered on whether or not the bill reflected a moderate approach. This is reflected particularly in the Tax Revision Bill, and the Communications Satellite bill, which generated a filibuster by reason of its moderate approach. Even the watered-down Farm bill, approved by Congress after a third try, reflects a moderate approach to legislation.

Earlier this session the Senate rejected the Medical Care for the Aged bill, and the House disapproved of the Urban Affairs Plan. It appears unlikely that this Congress will enact the Mass Transit, Youth Employment, or Federal Aid to Education bills. Congress has cleared legislation governing Public Works, Communications Satellites, and Welfare Program Revision. Corporate, Excise, and Travel taxes, and Sugar Controls were extended earlier during the session. A Reserve Callup Resolution granting the President standby authority until February 28, 1963 to call to active duty 150,000 members of the Armed Forces Ready Reserves won quick approval.

I think Congress has approved a construction legislative program and that its moderate approach reflects the sentiments of the people.

Gore Amendment—I am glad to say that the Gore Amendment to H. R. 10, which would apply a special tax rule to lump sum payments of employee pension plans, has been deleted by the Senate-House Conference Committee. It was retroactive legislation, and it was not just when compared with other laws governing pension funds.

Farm Legislation—The Senate has been passing farm legisla-

tion most of this session. The bill approved by Congress has some good provisions in it. Candor compels me to say that there are many things in the bill which I do not favor. In essence, Congress had to pass a bill, because the alternative of no action was worse. If no bill had been passed, the permanent law granting high price supports with virtually no controls on wheat and feed grains would have operated again.

For some years we have had wheat and feed grains running out of our ears. We have had a system with virtually no controls on feed grains, but with high price supports. I have the conviction that if we are going to have price supports, it is just as essential that we have controls that are effective on wheat and feed grains. Cotton, tobacco, and peanut programs have effective controls along with price supports. These programs have worked well. The current farm bill illustrates once more that in considering major legislation it is seldom that a measure is all good or all bad. The farm alternatives are plain, but as yet Congress has not given a clear cut answer.
