Town Council Proceedings

Edenton, N. C.
Oct. 11, 1962.

The Town Council met this day in regular session at 7:30 P. M. at the town office.

Members present: Mayor John A. Mitchener, Jr., J. E. Bufflap, George A. Byrum, Luther C. Parks, C. A. Phillips, R. Elton Forehand and R. D. Dixon, Jr.

Mayor Mitchener called the meeting to order and gave the invocation.

Mayor Mitchener praised Chief LaVoie for the work of the Police Department during the recent Democratic rally. He also directed the chief to write the commanding officer of National Guard unit expressing his appreciation for the work of members of the local unit during the same rally.

Mayor Mitchener expressed his appreciation for the work of the Fire Department during the Democratic rally.

Thomas C. Byrum, Jr., appeared with W. P. Jones to express his concern over the development of industry at the NAAS. He asked the Council to request L. L. Lester to meet with the Industrial Committee of the Chamber of Commerce, Town Council, and E. & W. Board to inform them of his plans for the development of the United States Lumber Company.

The Council requested the Mayor to write L. L. Lester a letter stating that United Properties, Inc., had until November 15th, 1962 to complete the access road to the sewage disposal plant site, and if it was not possible to vehicular traffic by that date the agreement between United Properties, Inc., and the Town of Edenton would be null and void. The letter is to also state that if suitable progress had not been made on this work by November 1, 1962, the agreement would be declared null and void on the latter date.

John Graham appeared on behalf of Joe Crisanti. He requested that the lease for the 54.7 acres be increased in length. The Council increased the lease to 3 years with option to renew for 3 additional years. Councilman Forehand was directed to meet with Mr. Crisanti and his attorney to work out a suitable agreement for the transfer of the railroad tracks to N. S. Railroad.

Motion was made by C. A. Phillips, seconded by Luther C. Parks, and duly carried that Mayor Mitchener be authorized to execute the deed between the Town of Edenton and V.E.P. Co., for a 50 foot wide easement to extend E. Freemason St.

Motion was made by George A. Byrum, seconded by C. A. Phillips and duly carried that the following ordinance be adopted:

Ordinance To Protect The Public Interest And Safety:

Whereas, picketing disturbances on the public streets of Edenton have resulted in injury to the person of the Edenton Chief of Police and danger of bodily harm and monetary loss to the general public exists, but at the same time recognizing the rights of any person or group of persons to peacefully picket for lawful purposes, it shall now, therefore, be unlawful for any person or group of persons whatsoever to picket any residence or place of business within the municipal limits of the incorporated Town of Edenton, unless 24 hour notice of the proposed intent to picket has been given to the Town Council of Edenton in writing through the Town Clerk's office.

A permit to organize a picket line must be obtained from the Town Clerk. Said permit is to be obtained 24 hours in advance of the beginning date of the proposed picketing. Fee for such permit is hereby set at the rate of \$10.00 per day for each day the picketing exists from the beginning date to the termination date inclusive, payable in advance to the Collector of the Town of Edenton.

Violation of this ordinance will be punishable by imprisonment not to exceed 30 days or fine not more than \$200.00, in the discretion of the Court. Each day picketing continues without the required permit shall constitute a separate offense by each person engaged therein. The effective date of this ordinance is October 11, 1962.

Motion was made by George A. Byrum, seconded by R. Elton Forehand and duly carried that pickets not be allowed to walk more than 5 ft. from curb line and be in continuous motion.

Jesse Harrell appeared to request on APW meeting held in

Raleigh which was attended by himself, Mr. Gardner and Mr. Hines.

George A. Byrum reported on the progress of the Building Committee.

Councilman Dixon requested street improvements in West-ward Heights area. He was requested to bring in a signed petition of the property owners.

Motion was made by George A. Byrum, seconded by R. Elton Forehand and duly carried that the sidewalk at the hospital be paved with the Town of Edenton paying 50% and the Chowan Hospital, Inc., pay 50% (approximately 315 1/2 ft.).

Motion was made by R. Elton Forehand, seconded by J. E. Bufflap and duly carried that E. & W. Dept. bills in the amount of \$22,043.20 be paid.

Motion was made by C. A. Phillips, seconded by J. E. Bufflap, and duly carried that Town of Edenton bills in the amount of \$2,767.99 be paid as follows:

A joint meeting of the Town Council and the Board of Public Works was held this day at 8:15 P. M., at the town office.

Council members present: Mayor John A. Mitchener, Jr., J. E. Bufflap, George A. Byrum, Luther C. Parks, R. Elton Forehand and R. D. Dixon, Jr.

Board of Public Works members present: Jesse L. Harrell, J. P. Ricks, Jr., J. H. Conger, Jr., and Ralph E. Parrish.

Jesse L. Harrell enumerated the projects of the E&W. Board on which application would be made for 50% Federal Grant under the Accelerated Public Works program. They are as follows:

Brown-Boswell Sewer Project \$ 90,000
Jackson Street Sewer Project 59,000
Highway 17 Sewer 11,000
Barker and Leigh Street Sewer Project 10,000
Albemarle Street Sewer Project 32,000
Dock St. Sewer Project 5,000

Sewage Abatement Facilities 543,000
Fire Protection Improvements 9,000
Albemarle Street Water Line 13,000
Industrial Park Sewer Project 26,000

George Byrum enumerated the project of the Town of Edenton on which application would be made for 50% Federal Grant under the Accelerated Public Works Program:

Municipal Building \$ 85,000
Fire Station 30,000
Storm Drainage 133,000
Eden St. resurfacing, curb, gutter 4,000
Street construction in West Edenton 40,000
Extension of E. Freemason St. to Jackson St. 20,000

Total \$312,000

It was stated that sufficient monies were available for the Town of Edenton to furnish their proportionate share of this money. It was also brought out that other projects could possibly be added at a later date.

It was decided Wm. F. Freeman, Inc., would be given the job of designing the fire station work. Wm. F. Freeman, Inc., was also directed to begin preparation of final plans and specifications on these projects on the basis of the contract between

the Town of Edenton and that company.

Shelton Moore requested that the Hawkins property (53x100ft) on Second Street adjacent to the John W. Graham lot be rezoned neighborhood business. The Council referred this to the Zoning Board for their recommendation and called for a public hearing to be held on November 13, 1962.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.
