

### The Grace Of God

Much is said in our world today about being saved from sin. Preachers design sermons to teach people how to be saved. Sunday School teachers teach lessons on it, tracts are passed out on the streets and radio and television evangelists harp on how to be saved. Sometimes I think people hear it so much and in so many ways that finally it grows old to them and rolls off their ears. Paul in dealing with this vital subject spoke simply, "For by Grace Are Ye Saved Through Faith; and That Not of Yourselves: It is the Gift of God." (Ephesians 2:8).

"He That Is Without Sin Among You, Let Him First Cast A Stone At Her." Speechless and in silence one by one they drifted away. After they were all gone Jesus turned to the poor woman and said, "Neither Do I Condemn Thee: Go, And Sin No More." (John 8). He gave her grace—something she needed but didn't deserve. God gave the whole world grace when He sent His Son to earth to die and pay the price of sin for mankind. We didn't deserve to be forgiven of our sins, we deserved punishment. But God loved us enough to give each of us His grace that we may be saved. Paul goes a little further, however, "For by grace are ye saved — through faith." To receive this grace from God we must first have faith in Jesus Christ. If we don't believe in God's grace how can we receive the benefit of it. We must have faith in Christ. Not just faith that a man once lived by the name of Jesus, but to have so much faith in Him that we actually make Him the center of our lives. We could conclude with extending Paul's words to their full meaning. "For by the grace of God are ye saved from sin, by faith in the Lord Jesus Christ."

### Town Council Proceedings

Edenton, N. C., August 15, 1963

The Town Council met this day in regular session at 8 P. M., at the Town Office. Members present: Mayor John A. Mitchell, Jr., Edwin Bufflap, George A. Byrum, Luther C. Parks, C. A. Phillips, R. Elton Forehand and J. D. Elliott. Mayor Mitchell called the meeting to order and Councilman Bufflap gave the invocation.

Councilman Elliott was directed to investigate possible locations for the three pieces of Fire Department apparatus now located in the County building that is slated to be demolished. He was further directed to secure a location before the next Council meeting if circumstances made it necessary.

Councilman Byrum gave a report of the Building Committee and recommended that the Council advertise for bids for the Municipal Building construction immediately.

Motion was made by George A. Byrum, seconded by R. Elton Forehand and duly carried that Raymond Fuson, architect, be instructed to advertise for bids for the Edenton Municipal Building. Voting No: Parks.

The Council discussed the relative merits of creating the office of Town Administrator which would make all purchasing, work closely with all department heads in the performance of their duties. The clerk was directed to mail to each councilman a set of ordinances setting out the above for further consideration.

Motion was made by George A. Byrum, seconded by J. D. Elliott and duly carried adopting the following resolution:

**RESOLUTION PASSED BY EDENTON TOWN COUNCIL**  
WHEREAS, the Board of Councilmen of the Town of Edenton has determined that it is in the best interest of the Town to extend its water and sewer systems and that in order to provide such extensions it is necessary to assess part of the cost thereof upon the real property abutting thereon.  
NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Councilmen of the Town of Edenton as follows:

1. That the water and sewer systems of the Town of Edenton shall be extended by constructing a water and sewer line over, along, and to the following property:

(C) From northern margin of U. S. Highway 17 southwardly along Barker Street to intersection of Barker and Williamson Streets; thence westwardly along Williamson Street 200 feet, more or less.

(D) From northern margin of U. S. Highway No. 17 at its intersection with Leigh Street and running thence southwardly along Leigh Street 600 feet, more or less, to the southern terminus of Leigh Street.

(E) From northern margin of Church Street extended (N. C. Highway No. 32) along Jackson Street 900 feet, more or less, northwardly to the intersection of Jackson Street and proposed extension of Freemason Street.

(F) From eastern margin of Jackson Street westwardly 135 feet, more or less, along Church Street Extended (N. C. Highway No. 32) to point opposite the proposed Town of Edenton pumping station located at the southwest corner of junction of Church Street Extended (N. C. Highway No. 32).

(G) From the western margin of Mosely Street at its junction with Albemarle Street westwardly along the northern margin of Albemarle Street 1800 feet, more or less, to the city limits.

(H) From the western margin of Mosely Street at its junction with Albemarle Street westwardly along the southern margin of Albemarle Street 1800 feet, more or less, to the city limits.

(I) From western margin of Twiddy Avenue at its junction with Albemarle Street southwardly along Twiddy Avenue 400 feet.

(J) From the existing water line on Twiddy Avenue 600 feet, more or less, along the eastern side of Twiddy Avenue to Albemarle Street.

(K) Sewer line to be installed to serve proposed M. G. Brown Lumber Company subdivision.

(L) From Virginia Road southwardly along Granville Street to Cemetery Street thence eastwardly 500 feet more or less along said Cemetery Street to existing sanitary sewer outfall.

2. That the total cost of said improvements, exclusive of cost of sewer pumping station and effluent line and street crossings, and based upon cost of six (6") inch cast iron water pipe and ten (10") inch terra cotta sewer pipe, be hereafter assessed upon the lots and parcels of land abutting directly upon the extensions hereinabove described according to the extent of their respective frontages by an equal rate per foot of such frontage, in accordance with authority vested in the Town by Section 160-241 of the General Statutes of North Carolina, and in accordance with existing water and sewer extension assessment policy of the Town of Edenton.

3. That the assessment herein provided for shall be payable in each or if any property owner shall so elect and give notice of that fact to the Board of Councilmen in accordance with Section 160-247 of the General Statutes of North Carolina, he shall have the option and privilege of paying the assessment in ten (10) equal annual installments, said installments to bear interest at the rate of six per cent per annum.

4. That the Town Clerk is hereby directed to publish this Resolution in The Chowan Herald on the 22nd day of August, 1963.

Motion was made by C. A. Phillips, seconded by R. Elton Forehand and duly carried authorizing the clerk to advertise for two 1964 police cars as soon as the new models are available.

Motion was made by J. D. Elliott, seconded by R. Elton Forehand and duly carried approving the right-of-way agreement for a 100,000 volt transmission line with VEPCO.

W. B. Gardner gave a progress report to the Council on the anticipated street work and parking lot construction. This work to commence around September 1st, 1963.

A report on the progress of the sewage disposal plant was also given by Mr. Gardner. The plant should be ready for use sometime in November, 1963. The sewer use charge which will pay off the bonds, will start with the December 1st, 1963 billing.

Motion was made by J. E. Bufflap, seconded by J. D. Elliott and duly carried authorizing the clerk to advertise for insurance bids for 1963-64 fiscal year. Councilmen Parks and Phillips were directed to work with a similar committee of the E&W Dept. to discuss equipment needs for the town and to bring back recommendations for such equipment.

Mayor Mitchell gave a report of the Good Neighbor Committee.

Motion was made by J. Edwin Bufflap, seconded by George A. Byrum and duly carried approving for payment E. and W. Dept. bills in the amount of \$126,751.86.

Motion was made by J. D. Elliott, seconded by R. Elton Forehand and duly carried approving for payment Town of Edenton bills in the amount of \$7,902.87.
