



Establishing Coastal Bermuda Grass

Bertram Hollowell up in the Cross Roads Community is establishing about 5 acres of Coastal Bermuda grass for cattle grazing and hay. Coastal Bermuda is a hybrid bermuda and produces more pounds of forage and more days of grazing per year than any other known plant available today. It is similar to common bermuda in appearance but is larger, more vigorous and more productive. Land too sandy to produce hardy anything else will produce coastal, however, it does well on most soils in our area if it isn't too wet. The quality of the hay is excellent. Wilbert Hare and Edgar Hollowell established a few acres of coastal about three or four years ago and like it so well they continue to expand their acreage each year. Coastal Bermuda grass does most of its growing in the hot summer months when most of the other pastures are not doing so well. It is not a plant to replace the other pasture plants but to supplement them for more year-around grazing. It is also the best pasture plant known for sandy land.

flowed up along the edge of the ditch and seeded to grass to prevent the surface water from running directly over the side slopes except at the low places where the surface inlets are being installed. The inlets allow the surface water to run through into the ditch without causing the side slopes of the ditch to cave. They can be made of several things ranging from old tin and boards to corrugated metal pipe. At the ends of plow drains where the drains empty into large ditches are ideal places for surface inlets. Almost all ditches will fill up in a short period of time if adequate provisions are not made to get the surface water in them.
