Chowan County Commissioners, after long and serious consideration of anticipated expenditudes and income, presented and adopted the county's budget for 1964-65 at their meeting Monday

Though the various department budgets reflected an increase in appropriations, the Commissioners were able to juggle figures to the extent that the new budget will remain the same as last year-\$1.58 per \$100 property valuation, plus a 10cent rate for fire protection for those living outside the Edenton city limits.
