Several of his research finds were files enumerating the various ships that cleared the "Port of Roanoke," which was the name given Edenton in the early records. The ship's cargoes were disclosed and the ports of destinations for vessels clearing Edenton Bay which sailed to the West Indies and Europe. Mr. Parramore stated that he plans to devote a large part of the history to the Revolutionary period. The history is expected to be completed, he stated, next month.
