Naturally, the heaviest vote on the three questions before Chowan farmers was the peanut assessment and 394 cast their votes in favor of the proposal with only seven voting "no."

Cotton ranked second in this area with 342 votes for the proposal and four against.

The tobacco referendum vote here was 212 in favor of production control quotas with three farmers casting negative votes. Then 212 voted in favor of the tobacco assessment and five voted against it.

Classes are scheduled to be gin in Edenton on January 4 1965 and will run for 30 weeks.




