1965 Cotton Program
This year those farms on which the domestic allotment is less than the effective allotment are required to be signed up by March 26, 1965. It has previously been announced that everyone who wished to receive domestic allotment payments would have to sign up. This has been changed and will generally be producers over 15.0 acres who intend to cut back to get the allotment.

Benefits under the domestic allotment are:
1. Eligible for price support loan at 29c per pound (middle one-inch at average location).
2. Additional price support payment of 4.35 cents a pound on normal yield of acreage planted for harvest in 1965.

All producers over 15.0 acres that reduce their allotment to qualify for domestic allotment payment must stay within the feed grain base for the farm.

1965 Feed Grain Program

Basically the 1965 feed grain program is the same as for 1964—a voluntary program. It combines corn, grain sorghum and barley as a single base. Participating farmers will qualify for diverted acreage payments and price support payments and they will be eligible for price support loans on their corn. It offers producers an opportunity to reduce the grain price while maintaining or improving feed grain income.

Producers are required to plant within their base on all or farms that they operate. The largest amount that can be diverted for payment is 50 percent of the base or 25 acres. The smallest amount that can be diverted is 20 percent of the base established for the farm. A producer participates by as much as 40 percent of the base. The payment will be at the high payment rate. The sign up period begins Monday, February 8 and ends Friday, March 26, 1965.

New Grower Allotments

The final date to make a request for a new grower cotton, tobacco, peanut allotment or feed grain base is February 15, 1965.

Reminders

1. Final date to release cotton acreage—March 5, 1965.
2. Final date to apply for released acreage—February 19, 1965.
