A NEW GENERATION-One of Edenton's finest leaders is generally relinquishing his many public duties and passing them to another generation.

We refer to Philip S. McMullan, a most distinguished citizen who has set a fine example of unselfish public service for all to envy.

This week it is reported that he has resigned as chairman of the Edepton 'City Board of Education. He served his town well on this important board for 20 years, two of them as chairman.

Earlier, Mr. McMullan officially got out of politics by stepping down as chairman of the Chowan County Board of Elections. His length of service on this board numbered more than 30 years.

In each of the above instances, Mr. McMullan relinquished important duties and the reins were taken by young men with proven ability and a willingness to perform un-

selfish public service. Dr. Edward G. Bond, a soft spoken leader and highly respected physician, was named chairman of the school board. Although he was named to the board only last September, his wise counsel and sound judgment was appreciated and recognized by those who had




