

Around The Farms In Chowan County

This week we will give you a brief summary of our community and area development work in Chowan County as taken from the annual narrative report of Extension work.

Community Development—Community development is designed to promote and encourage community action and effort that will enable progressive minded families and leaders, living in that community, to pool their interests to develop and maintain a useful and admirable community. This is proposed to be done by utilizing both human and material resources that will provide more opportunities for economic, home, community and youth development.

Thirteen communities in Chowan County organized and participated in the county contest for 1965. Two communities participated in the Albemarle area 10-county contest. Some of the projects worked on in varying degrees by community development organizations included: Stressing increased crop yields, livestock production and industrial development for increased family income; the beautification of the home surroundings and improved environment for a more attractive community and better family relations and living; building and improving community centers and facilities that can be realized from cooperative efforts which may not be possible otherwise, and providing opportunities for youth development through organized groups, more active participation in church pro-

grams and providing and supervising recreational activities. Varying degrees of progress were realized by the organized communities. However, in telling their stories to the judges, all communities expressed a feeling that their accomplishments was an indication of their winning regardless of how they were placed by the judges.

Area Development—The Albemarle Area Development Association (AADA) is composed of the 10 counties of Hyde, Tyrrell, Washington, Dare, Currituck, Camden, Chowan, Pasquotank, Perquimans and Gates. The objectives of the AADA is to develop both the area and the individual counties. The work is promoted by the following committees: Agriculture, Community Development, Economic Opportunity Development, Fine Arts and Crafts, Industry and Travel and Recreation. Your Extension workers aided Chowan County in this cooperative effort. Some of the activities and accomplishments during 1965 were as follows:

Agriculture—The area agricultural committee promoted the market hog show and sale in February. In August a farm shop and machinery storage tour was held. The concentrated soil testing drive was conducted September-December. The area feeder calf sale was held in October. Chowan County people participated in all of these.

Community Development—Chowan, with six other counties, participated and

Stadium Drive Now Underway

WINSTON-SALEM — Ray S. Jones of 1209 Pryor Street, Elizabeth City, has been named chairman of a six-county area in the coming drive to raise \$2½ million for a new football stadium for Wake Forest College.

The goal for the area is \$19,000. Counties which Jones will canvass and their goals are: Camden, Currituck and Pasquotank, combined goal of \$41,000; and Chowan, Gates and Perquimans, a combined goal of \$8,000.

Over-all chairman of the fund drive is Bert Bennett, Winston-Salem businessman and former head of the State Democratic Executive Committee. Joe Branch of Enfield, legislative counsel for Gov. Dan Moore, is co-chairman.

The drive for special gifts will begin in late February. Bennett said he hopes to wind up the campaign in the state and nation by April 5. Plans call for a 30,000-seat stadium on a 77-acre tract near the Wake Forest campus. Target date for completion of the project is October 1, 1967. The building committee hopes to let a construction contract around June 1.

Estimated cost will be \$2½ million. Most of the money is expected to be raised in North Carolina, but the fund drive will be carried into all 50 states.



SOCIAL SECURITY Questions and Answers

George Dietrich, Field Representative of the Social Security Administration is in Edenton every Thursday and is located in the old Municipal Building.

This week the Social Security Administration mailed out over a million reminder letters to social security beneficiaries who have not signed up for the supplementary medical insurance part of Medicare.

Medicare kits, including an enrollment card for the medical insurance plan, were sent during the fall to the 15½ million social security and railroad retirement beneficiaries 65 or over. About two-thirds of these people have sent back their cards, and 90 per cent have checked "Yes" for medical insurance under Medicare.

"In North Carolina," Thomas F. Wyatt, social security district manager in Greenville, said today, "292,308 people received Medicare kits and enrollment cards last fall. As of the first week in January, 154,706 had signed up for the supplementary medical insurance plan.

"Many of the people who have not signed up may not understand how the plan will work and what it offers," he added. "The letter going out from social security headquarters in Baltimore, Maryland, this week should answer some of their questions."

Enclosed with this second letter is another enrollment card in case they lost the first one or sent it in marked "No," and have since changed their minds.

"For people now 65 or over," he emphasized, "there is a deadline for signing up for the supplementary medical insurance plan. If your coverage is to begin as soon as the Medicare program goes into effect, you have to be enrolled by March 31, 1966.

"The medical insurance program, like the basic hospital insurance plan, will go into effect beginning July 1st. People now over 65 who don't sign up by March 31 may have to wait two years before their coverage will be effective."

The supplementary medical insurance plan, Wyatt continued, covers primarily doctor and surgeon bills but also includes a variety of other

service retirees.

The primary message carried in the reminder letter, he said, is that people now over 65 have only until March 31 to sign up for the optional medical insurance plan if their coverage is to begin on July 1st.

"Anyone who still has questions about this part of Medicare should get in touch with the social security office," Wyatt concluded. "The Social Security Administration is anxious to make sure that everyone who is eligible makes an INFORMED decision."
