H. V. Anderson, audi-visual consultant at the North Carolina State Library in Raleigh, will be on hand to answer questions as to the procedures to be used in borrowing the films shown since all will be available for loan from the public library.

These films will be shown in the order of their listing: Sailing, a 13-minute color study of the sport.

Anyone For Diving, a half hour color film produced by the Los Angeles County Parks Commission to motivate skin and skuba divers to take safety instruction.

Captive and Children Without, two half-hour film documenting poverty situations and usable in training workers with the Office of Economic Opportunity.

The City and the Future, a half-hour film describing the city of tomorrow as seen by Lewis Mumford.

In America, an 18-minute film made from old prints and drawings showing the wild west of American history.

Rivers of Time, a half-hour color study of the influences of Mesopotamia on western culture.

Katie's Lot, a 16-minute nostalgic picture of a little girl at the stage in life between childhood and adolescence.

I Never Went Back, an 18-minute color motivational picture for those who have dropped out of school.

The Colonial Naturalist, an hour long color biography of the colonial artist-naturalist, Mark Catesby, produced by the Williamsburg Foundation.

Hollowell Calls Annual Meeting

FONTANA DAM — 30th Division veterans of Georgia, Tennessee, and the Carolinas will hold a reunion at Fontana Village Resort, Fontana Dam, N. C., May 20-22, 1966.

Host for the regional conclave will be the Tar Heel Chapter, 30th Division Association. A special effort to bring together World War I survivors of the famous Old Hickory Division has been announced by Chapter President E. L. Hollowell of Edenton. Vice President Frank Swan of Andrews, a World War I veteran, and Robert Sloan of Fontana Dam, a World War II veteran, are in charge of arrangements for the reunion.

The Great Smoky Mountains resort is centrally located for the reunion. It is situated 9 miles from the Tennessee border, and less than 200 miles from Atlanta, Georgia and Greenville, South Carolina.

The 30th Division of both Wars was made up primarily of national guardsmen of the Carolinas, Tennessee, and Georgia.

World War I survivors have not had a national reunion since the 1930's, and

many are unaware of the existence of the 30th Division Association. Veterans and their families desiring additional information about the reunion are requested to write to Robert Sloan, Reunion Chairman, Fontana Dam, N. C.

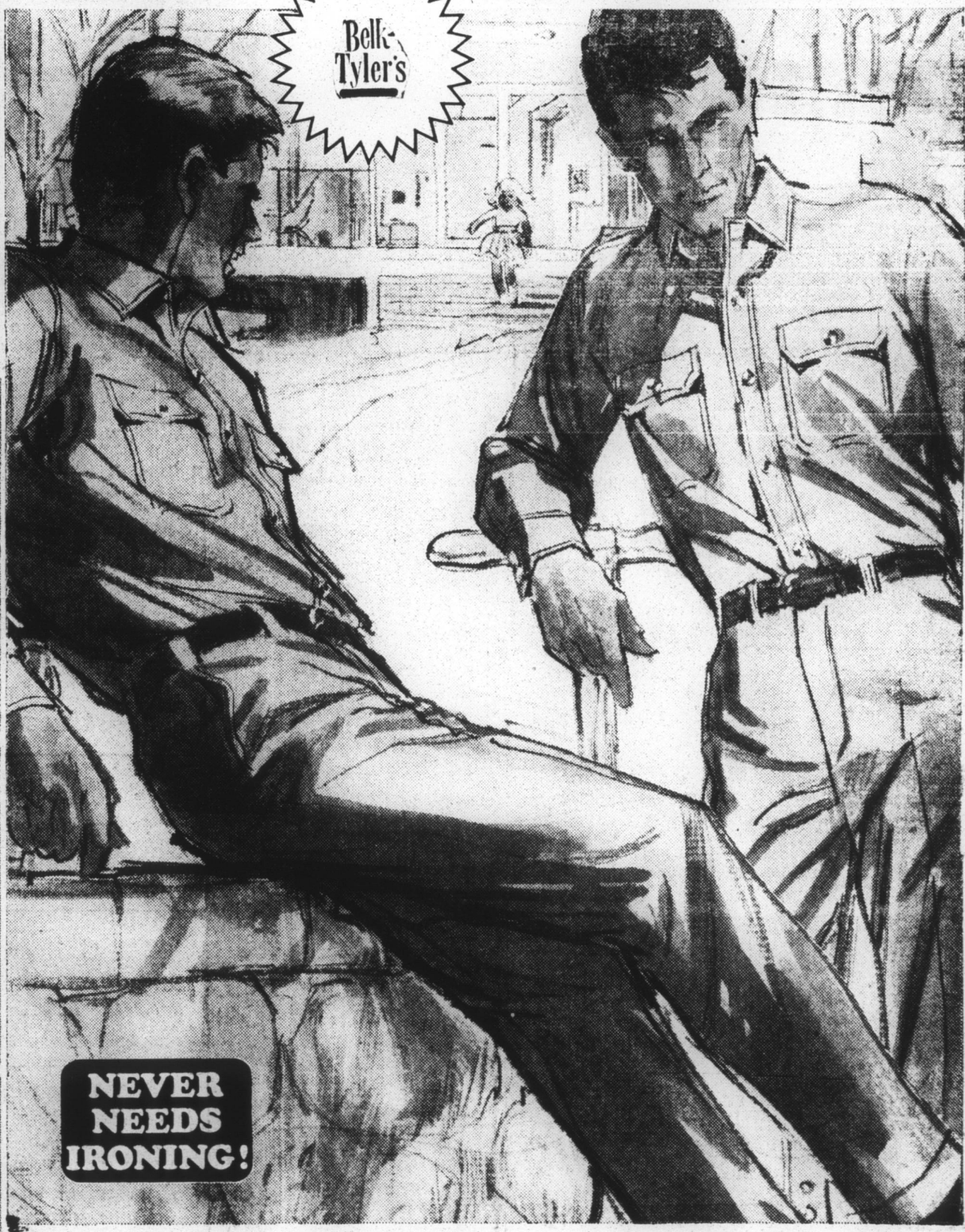
