Even while the debate is in progress, however, the question of whether or not the United States should engage in a war in Southeast Asia is becoming more and more an academic one. We are already engaged in a war there. Our men are being killed and wounded daily in this war. We are confronted by a condition and not a theory. What has been largely, unrealized by the mation is the extent of our commitment there.

Now we must face certain stern realities about Vietnam and our position there. There are only three courses of action open to the United States. The first is to settle the war by negotiation; the second is to fight the war with a will to win it; and the faird is to withdraw our forces from South Nietnam. The third course simply means that we would surrender Southeast Asia to the Viet Cong, who are Communist agents.

The other course is to withdraw our forces and surrender our position in South Vietnam.

One of the busiest places has not already done so. around right now is the Greenville social security office where the people are taking claims and explaining the changes made in the social security law, Thomas F. Wyatt, social security district manager in Greenville, said today.

"There is one problem that concerns us," Wyatt stated, "and we are asking the public to help. This is: how to get in touch with persons 65 or over who do not receive social security or railroad retirement benefits. This is important because these people may be eligible for the new program of health insurance — sometimes called Medicare."

If anyone knows or is related to someone 65 or over who does not receive social security or railroad retirement benefits, please get in touch with a social security

These individuals have un-

til March 31, 1966, to sign up for the voluntary medical insurance if they want this protection when the program starts on July 1, 1966.






