With this small bit of history up your sleeve, now what would you be servin' for supper this day—especially if you're Irish? Faith and begorra, corned beef and cabbage, of course. And since that is comparatively a very inexpensive dinner, it should please the Scotch in you, too. Here's a good recipe to cook this simple meal:

- 1 corned beef brisket,
- ½ tsp. Tabasco sauce,
- 1 sliced onion,
- ½ tsp. dried rosemary,
- 1 stalk celery.

1 carrot.
1 sprig parsley.
1 head green cabbage.
Place meat in large kettle of cold water. Add Tabasco, onion, bay leaf, rosemary, celery, carrot and parsley, cover. Bring to a boil and reduce heat. Simmer four to five hours. Wash cabbage, cut into quarters. About one-half hour before meat is done, skim excess fat from top of liquid and arrange cabbage on meat. Cover and simmer 15 minutes or until cabbage is crisp-tender.

Here also is a recipe for Emerald Sauce—very good

- 1 cup corned beef stock, with cabbage:
- 2 tsp. flour,
- 1 tsp. horseradish,
- ¼ tsp. Tabasco,
- ¼ cup chopped parsley,
- 2 tbsps. sour cream.

Pour stock in small saucepan. Combine flour with a little cold water and stir into stock. Add horseradish and Tabasco and bring to boil. Add parsley and sour cream and do not boil. Serve with corned beef and cabbage.

I just read an article written by a doctor in London who reported recently that several of her young girl patients with Acne were girls who wore their hair with a lock curling forward over one or both jaw lines.
