
ACP Funds Available In recent' weeks, many thousands of acres of trees in North Carch'ina have been destroyed by fire. These fires covered many areas of the State, though they were more prevalent in the Southeastern counties.

Agricultural Co.'s servation Program funds are evailable to farmers to help in reestablishing trees on this burned-over land. The costshare rate for planting trees is \$14.00 per acre. In ruany cases, this will cover a large portion of the out-of-pocket

cost to the farmer. If farmers replant soo.2 they can be assured of getting the type trees that are best suited to the area. If they wait too long, undesirable trees will often come up in the area. These undesirable trees are of little value and additional measures have to be taken to destroy these trees before good marketable species can be planted.




