Inpatient Hospital Service Hospital insurance will help to pay your care in a hospital for up to 90 days during each spell of illness. **Dollars** and Cents

Each spell of illness provides for 90 days of benefit services. For the first 60

days, the insurance pays for all but \$40 for the covered services you receive. From the 61st to the 90th day you would be responsible for the first \$10 each day for covered services.

What Hospital Insurance Will Cover

-Room and board in semi-private room (2 to 4 beds in a room).

-Nursing services ordinarily furnished to the hospital's patients.

-Supplies, appliances and equipment ordinarily furnished to the hospital's patients, such as splints, casts wheelchairs, crutches, etc.

-Blood transfusions, exspell of illness.

training programs. What Hospital Insurance Will Not Cover

-Private room, unless it is medically necessary - ordinarily only when the patient's condition requires him to be isolated (otherwise you pay the difference). -Private duty nurses.

-Cost of first three pints of blood (hospitals will not charge for pints replaced by donors).

-Physicians' and surgeons' ervices. (Medical insurance helps pay doctor bills).

-Personal comfort items, such as radio and telephone charges, TV rental, etc. -Hospital services after 90
