It was requested by Miss Arant, district home economics agent, that the appointment of Mrs. Mary Cowper be changed from temporary agent to permanent agent on September 1 when Miss Calloway's leave is up. The Commissioners granted this request. Mrs. Mary G. Cowper was unanimously appointed home economics agent effective September 1, 1966.

A motion was made by J. Clarence Leary, seconded by C. M. Evans and duly carried accepting the resignation of Robert S. Harrell, chairman of Edenton-Chowan County Good Neighbor Council with regret.

Upon motion of C. J. Hollowell, seconded by C. M. Evans, the following resolution was unanimously adopted: That the action of the Chowan County ABC Board taken at a special meeting of said Board held on June 9, 1966, providing that the employees of the Chowan County ABC store become members of the North Carolina Employees' Retirement System be and the same is hereby approved and ratified. A motion was made by J. Clarence Leary, seconded by Dallas Jethro, Jr., and duly carried increasing salary of John Lee Spruill, veterans' service officer, \$200.00 per year. A letter was read by the chairman from Norman L. Brinkley, president of the Chowan branch of NAACP, requesting the Commissioners to withhold funds allocated for Brown-Carver Library and Shepard-Pruden Memorial Library until there is one library in Chowan County to serve all the citizens without regard to race, creed or color. The NAACP asked that the Brown-Carver Library be closed immediately. The Commissioners agreed there was nothing they can do in this matter as all appropriations go to the Pettigrew Regional Library. The meeting was adjourned to convene with the Board of Education for the purpose of appointing a member to the ABC Board.

.05 rural fire district was adopted. James G. Blake, III, community planner of the Department of Conservation and Development, and Mayor John A.
