German Potato Salad

2/3 cup instant mixed onion
2/3 cup water
3/4 cup chopped celery
1/3 cup bacon fat
2 teaspoons salt
1 teaspoon sugar
1/2 teaspoon black pepper
3/4 cup water
1/2 cup vinegar
6 cups diced hot cooked potatoes
2 tablespoons mayonnaise
8 slices bacon, crumbled
Stuffed olives for garnish
Combine onion and water. Let stand five minutes and set aside for later use. Sauté celery in bacon fat or until limp. Add softened onion and saute three to four minutes. Add salt, sugar, pepper, water and vinegar slowly to prevent spattering. Boil

Westvaco Names Bell As Manager

MANTEO — Dare County native A. Quentin Bell, Jr., has been appointed manager of the North Carolina Woodlands operation of West Virginia Pulp and Paper.

Westvaco Timberlands Division Manager D. Y. Lenhart of New York said the 30-year-old Bell will take over his new position August 1. He currently is serving as a company district forester in Camden, S. C.

North Carolina Woodlands, headquartered in Manteo, is responsible for the management of more than 300,000 acres of Westvaco forest lands located in the northeastern part of the state.

Bell replaces W. J. Crumpacker, who has been assigned new duties by the company and will move to Summerville, S. C. Lenhart said that Crumpacker will assume the position of senior company forester and will work on special projects for the division.

Bell is a Manteo native and an honors graduate from N. C. State University with a bachelor of science degrees in wildlife management and horticulture. He attended graduate school at Duke University.

After working briefly for the U. S. Park Service at Cape Hatteras National Seashore, Bell joined Westvaco

in February 1959 as an assistant district forester six months later and transferred to Camden in 1965.

Bell is married to the former Carolee O'Neal of Manteo, and is the father of two children.

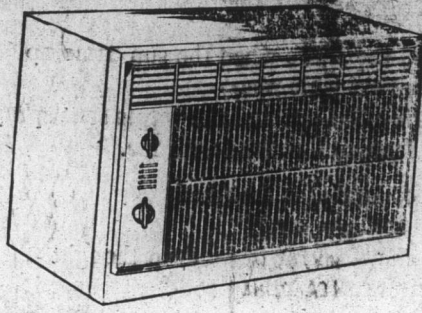
Crumpacker is a native of Durham, and received his master's degree in Forestry at Duke University in 1940. He worked with Canal Wood Corp., U. S. Gypsum and the Union-Camp Corp., before joining Westvaco in 1953. He became North Carolina Woodlands manager in 1959.

He is married to the former Emma Lee Smith, and is the father of two children. North Carolina Woodlands is one of six Westvaco woodlands operations which manage more than a million acres of forest lands in the United States and Brazil.
