The Town Council of the Town of Edenton met this day in regular session at the Edenton Municipal Building at 8:00 P. M.

Members present: Mayor John A. Mitchener, Jr., J. Edwin Bufflap, Luther C. Parks, David G. White, and Leo Katkaveck.

Mayor Mitchener called the meeting to order and Councilman Parks gave the invocation. Councilman J. D. Elliott submitted a letter of resignation as Councilman from the First Ward which was brought about by his moving from the confines of this Ward. He expressed his thanks to the Councilmen and employees of the City and said that he looks forward to working with the Council on future projects. Motion by Luther C. Parks, seconded by J. Edwin Bufflap, duly carried, accepting Councilman Elliott's resignation with deep regret and expressing the Council's thanks to him for a job well done.

Motion by J. Edwin Bufflap, seconded by Leo Katkaveck, unanimously carried awarding the bid for two 1967 four door Police auto-

mobiles, per Town's specifications, to George Chevrolet Company for a bid of \$2,360. The Administrator was directed to notify Mr. George that service on these cars would be expected and that the delivery time would be as soon as possible.

A request of Carolina Trailway Company for the delimitation of bus parking area at the bus terminal was tabled at this time. Administrator was directed to inform the Company that no action would be taken at present.

Administrator reported that Mr. Victor Bryant stated that Mr. Lawson Lester had signed the re-negotiation lease and it was in the mail to the Town of Edenton at the present time.

A letter was read from Mrs. Ole S. Neilson, Albemarle Court area, relative to the air pollution problem created by Albemarle Peanut Company. Mr. Gardner read a letter directed to Mrs. Neilson which requested the Peanut Company to investigate this matter and report their findings to him as soon as possible.

A request from the Taxi Drivers was presented to the Council by Mr. Gardner which requested that they be granted four parking places in the parking lot adjacent to P & Q Super Market. The Council's feeling in that they have no obligation to furnish private parking places for the Taxi drivers and requested the Chief of Police to notify them that a certain lot located on West Queen Street could possibly be rented to use as a taxi stand.

Resignation from Town Attorney W. S. Privott, effective December 1, 1966, was read. Motion by Leo Katkaveck, seconded by D. G. White, unanimously carried accepting Mr. Privott's resignation with regret expressing the Council's thanks to him for all services and wishing him the best in future endeavors.

The Industrial Committee of the Edenton Chamber of Commerce, met with the Council to discuss matters relative to securing a proposed industry for the Edenton Municipal Airport Area. Certain recommendations were presented to the Coun-

oil upon motion by Luther C. Parks, seconded by Leo Katkaveck, unanimously carried, approving recommendations as presented by the Industrial Committee instructing them to act on same.

Motion by J. Edwin Bufflap, seconded by Leo Katkaveck, unanimously carried approving E&W Department bills in the amount of \$35,371.39 for payment.

Motion by J. Edwin Bufflap, seconded by David G. White, unanimously carried approving Town of Edenton bills in the amount of \$43,055.27 for payment.

There being no further business the meeting adjourned.

The Town Council met this day in Special Session at 11:30 A. M., at the Municipal Building.

Members present: Mayor John A. Mitchener, Jr., J. E. Bufflap, Luther C. Parks, Leo Katkaveck, Henry G. Quinn and David G. White.

Motion was made by Luther C. Parks, seconded by David G. White and duly carried that the following resolution be adopted:

WHEREAS, this body duly assembled has taken cognizance of the vast amount of work being done by the State Highway Commission in the development of the Road Systems of the State in areas of the State other than the Albemarle Section and upon a comparison of the work being performed in the Albemarle Section with that being performed elsewhere, it is apparent to this group, collectively and individually, that this County and the Albemarle Section are not receiving their fair proportion of the allotment of funds and the performance of work on the Road Systems in this County and the Albemarle Section;

AND WHEREAS, the lack of a proportionate share of the work of the State Highway Commission being performed in this County and in the Albemarle Section is resulting in the economy of this area being adversely affected and the economy of the other areas of the State

placed in a more advantageous position;

AND, to that end that due protest be made;

BE IT RESOLVED: That this body respectfully calls attention of the State Highway Commission to the fact that this County and the Albemarle Section of the State are not receiving their proportionate part of appropriations and work in the development of the State Highway System.

FURTHER that this body endorses with enthusiasm the Albemarle Highway Committee Priority list and particularly endorses at this time

for immediate action Priority Number 1 on that list calling for the immediate signing of U. S. Highway No. 17 between Elizabeth City and Edenton.

FURTHER, let a copy hereof go to the State Highway Commission and to the Honorable Dan K. Moore, Governor, and to the State Senators and Members of the House of Representatives representing the Albemarle Section.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.
