Minutes Of Board Of Public Works For July

Edenton, N. C. July 5, 1967.
 The Board of Public Works of the Town of Edenton met this day in regular session at 8 P. M. at the Edenton Municipal Building.

Members present: Chairman Jesse L. Harrell, J. H. Conger, Jr., Thomas C. Byrum, Jr., J. P. Ricks, Jr. and W. J. P. Earnhardt, Sr. Mr. Luther Parks, member of Town Council, was in attendance.
 Minutes of the regular meeting of June 6, 1967, were read and approved.

Motion by Thomas C. Byrum, Jr., seconded by J. H. Conger, Jr., was unanimously carried approving E. & W. bills in the amount of \$45,153.75 for payment, and requesting Town Council to pay same from the 1967 budget and bill amounting to \$25,626.06 to be paid from the 1968 budget as follows:

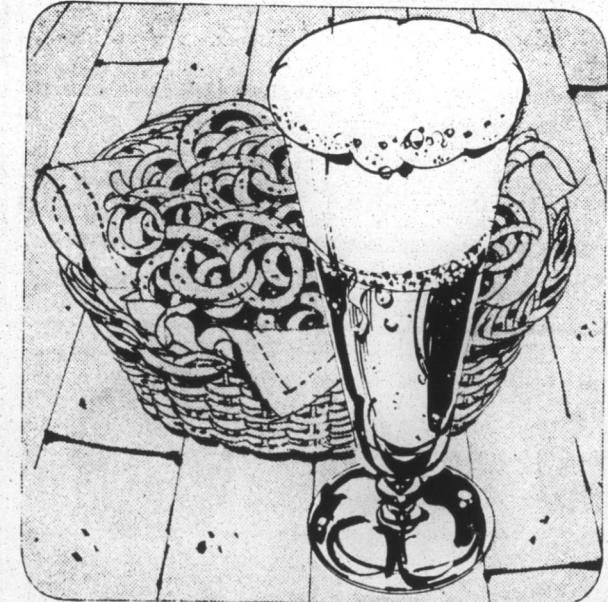

 Chairman Jesse Harrell noted that the billing for

the truck recently purchased by Byrum Implement Company was not included in the bill payments chargeable to the 1967 budget and requested that this be included.
 Mr. Harrell led a review and discussion of 1967 budget expenditures.
 Motion by Mr. Byrum, seconded by Mr. Ricks and unanimously carried that radio announcements in connection with the water situation be started immediately.
 Chairman Jesse L. Harrell delegated Mr. Earnhardt as Sewer Commissioner, Mr. Ricks as Electric Commissioner, Mr. Conger as Water Commissioner and vice chairman and Mr. Byrum as Finance Chairman. Mr. Harrell named Messrs. Byrum and Ricks to the Street Light Committee to serve with Messrs. Katka-veck and Shepard from the Council.
 Mr. Hines, superintendent, reported that the electrical outlets and water spigots authorized to be installed at the county dock for use of pleasure boats

had been completed and were in service. He stated that these facilities were used over the Fourth of July by a boat from Rhode Island.
 The hydrant installation along with two two-inch hose connection hydrants have also been installed and are in use at the Fire Station.
 Mr. Hines discussed with the Board of Public Works several operating problems, suggesting methods of handling them and was directed to dispose of them as outlined.
 A lengthy and detailed discussion was led by Mr. Hines in connection with the problems facing the

municipal electric systems of North Carolina as a result of the attitude shown by the 1967 Legislature toward amending the 1965 Electric Law which denied the towns and cities to exercise control of the facilities within the city limits. Mr. Hines also reviewed the program of actions taken by 11 North-eastern N. C. towns, including Edenton, in their efforts to get a reduced electric rate from VEPCO through the Federal Power Commission.
 There being no further business, the meeting adjourned.
