## Earl Goodwin Attends Meet

non, Henderson, Whitener and Gardner, I voted no on final passage, while Reps. Galifianawis, Taylor, Kornegay, Jonas and Broyhill voted for the bill.

Several amendments were adopted which should remove the objections of many to this legislation. For an example, if a person goes into another state for hunting purposes and his gun becomes lost, stolen or inoperable, upon an oath of his identity and residence, he will be permitted to purchase another gun from a licensed dealer, who in turn will be required to report the transaction to the chief law enforcement officer of the municipality where the purchaser resides.

I supported every amendment which would ease the restrictions on those law abiding citizens who are legally entitled to possess a gun or rifle. While on the other hand, I supported, too, the amendments which would impose added penalties on those who use a firearm in the commission of a crime. This includes the mandatory one year sentence for anyone who uses a firearm for the commission of a federal crime. This is a mandatory sentence and cannot be set aside by the presiding judge.

This amendment also provides that upon conviction of a second offense involving the use of a fire-

arm, the mandatory penalty will be five years in a federal penitentiary. As I stated before, I am of the opinion that this is a matter for the states, that is, to pass legislation dealing with the serious problem of the abusive use of firearms. It remains to be seen whether the Senate will concur in the House action or whether they will add such stringent measures such as federal registration and licensing for individuals.

Another bill of particular interest to our district was the extension of the Higher Education Act for 1969. This provides additional funds for colleges, universities and technical schools. We were able to add several amendments to this bill which will improve it.

One amendment was known as the "antiguide-line" amendment which states, "No standard, rule, regulation or requirement of general applicability prescribed for the administration of this act or any act amended by this act may take effect (1) until 30 days after it is published in the federal register, and (2) unless interested persons are given an opportunity to participate in the formulation of such standards, rule, regulation or requirement through the submission of views or arguments."

Briefly, this means that HEW cannot withhold funds for our institutions without following certain procedures.

Another amendment we were able to adopt was a denial of funds to certain students receiving National Defense Education Act funds who violate or disobey the rules and regulations of the institutions in which they are enrolled or who are convicted in the courts of certain misdemeanors or felonies while receiving federal assistance to attend college. The original language of the bill stated that the institution "may" suspend these funds but the House adopted the stronger word "shall" suspend these funds.

Every institution of higher learning in the district of which there are now at least seven with additional technical schools to be created in the near future, receives either directly or indirectly these funds. In view of this, on behalf of our institutions of higher learning, the students and the faculties, I voted yes on final passage. The bill passed 389 to 15.

# Make Church-Going A Habit . . .

## SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

RULER OF MEN AND NATIONS

International Sunday School Lesson for Aug. 4

Memory Selection: "Look unto me, and be ye saved, all the ends of the earth; for I am God, and there is none else."—Isaiah 45:22.

Lesson Text: Isaiah 45.

Today our lesson lies in the prophesies of Isaiah—a Book of great comfort, and one which expounds the majesty of God—His universality—and the role of mankind in service to God. Moreover, Jesus' ministry on earth ties in closely with the concepts of this Book, thereby making it even more valuable in the eyes of the devout Christian. Jesus taught that God was universal—a God for all peoples—of all nations, all beliefs—saints and sinners, alike. Also in this Book, is the same theme stressed, for we see Cyrus (the pagan conqueror and ruler) claimed as the anointed servant of the Lord. Indeed, it was under his rule that the Jews were permitted to return to their homeland—a leniency to which they had not been too well accustomed in their days of servitude.

It is not surprising, therefore, that the Prophet Isaiah saw in this turn of events the merciful hand of God, thereby concluding that God WAS a universal God, concerned with ALL people. For, although Cyrus was termed "the anointed of God" and served God's purpose through Israel. His history, he did not possess a personal knowledge of the Lord. Isaiah, therefore, concluded, quite logically, that God works in and throughout history. True, His purposes may not be clear to our limited insight, but of one thing we can be sure. He HAS a purpose for all His actions; this much has been proved, time and time again, when viewed in the light of later events.

Sometimes we may wonder why God permits the cruelties that are inflicted by man upon man. Sometimes we wonder why WE should be hurt by some calamity, such as war, the loss of a loved one, a broken home, or what have you. We cry aloud: WHY should this happen to ME? What did I do?"

What we fail to grasp is that most of the worst ills that befall mankind are made by mankind itself. God made man in His own image, and He endowed us with a brain and a free will. In so doing, He retired himself to the background, leaving man the choice of working out his own destiny. That man has abused this freedom of choice over and over again is lamentable; nevertheless, it is—of necessity—inevitable. However, God DOES act within the limits of man's freedom to control history, and to accomplish His purposes.

God enters redemptively into our deepest and most personal sorrows. And in so doing, He reveals His all-encompassing love for us; it goes without saying that if we are worthy of His concern in the affairs of men, we emerge a richer, more whole person than before—one with understanding, compassion, insight—and (above all)
