W. F. Sessoms, district engineer, State Highway Commission, gave a report on secondary road program for Chowan County. Mr. Sessoms reported that the Bray Hall road was the only active project at this time.

A motion was made by J. Clarence Leary, seconded by C. M. Evans and unanimously carried that secondary road plan presented by W. F. Sessoms be approved.

The lease on the building that was used for the Brown-Carver Library and OEO office will expire the last of April. It was agreed

to have the county attorney contact the owner of the building and ask for lease of building for one year to be used for office space.

R. W. Moore, chairman of OEO and Earl Jones gave a very informative report on the progress of the OEO program.

A motion was made by David T. Bateman, seconded by C. M. Evans and duly carried that C. W. Overman be given authority to purchase a film strip projector with remote control for agriculture extension office.

A motion was made by J. Clarence Leary, seconded by C. M. Evans and duly carried instructing the Sheriff to advertise 1968 uncollected county taxes in May and sale to be held first Monday in June.

The following notices to apply for a beer and wine permit for Colonial Motor Court and Restaurant and a beer permit for James A. Quain, "The Alibi Room," a beer permit for John Elton Roberts were approved.

R. N. Hines, representing the E. & W. Department, appeared before the Board requesting the Commissioners to share expenses

with the Town of Edenton in installing three or four new light fixtures on the Court House Green. No action was taken at this time.

Upon motion of David T. Bateman, seconded by J. Clarence Leary and unanimously carried that Commissioners will guarantee \$45,000.00 to insure construction of hospital with further contributions being deducted from above amount.

Upon motion of C. A. Phillips, seconded by C. M. Evans and unanimously carried that the Sheriff be relieved of 1967 taxes in the amount of \$925.20 for United States Lumber Co., leased from Town of Edenton, lease expired in 1966.

The following reports were accepted and ordered filed: County Extension Department; Welfare Department; Sheriff; Coroner; County Service Officer; Edenton Fire Department; Grand Jury report; County Accountant's report.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

Students Need S. S. Number To Begin Work

Students were reminded today of the importance of having a social security number when applying for summer employment.

An employer needs a record of each worker's social security number so that he can report the wages paid to each individual's social security record and pay the taxes due. The earnings credited to a worker's social security record are the basis for determining the amount of benefits payable to him and his family when he retires—or earlier, if he should die or become disabled.

If the employer does not have a worker's social security number when he sends in his first report after a worker is hired, he must file an additional report when he does get it. To avoid extra reports, some employers have adopted the practice of withholding wages until the worker supplies his number. A few have decided to refuse employment if the job applicant does not have his social security number with him.

Students should call or write the social security office as early as possible if they do not have a social security number. By getting the number early, you will save your future employer time and avoid the risk of being turned down for a job.

Office hours of the Elizabeth City Social Security office are 8:45 A. M. until 5 P. M., Monday through Friday and 9 A. M. until 12 noon on Saturday.

Cotton Allotment Vote Scheduled

Cotton farmers in Chowan County will vote this month to decide whether, in 1970, they want to be able to sell or lease their cotton allotments outside the county. A. C. Griffin, chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee, has announced. The referendum applies only to 1970 and will be conducted by mail during the period May 5 through May 9. Ballots may also be delivered by hand to the ASCS county office.

The only question to be decided by the balloting is whether upland cotton allotments may be transferred during the next year to other farms by sale or lease. Such transfers may be made by sale or lease for a period of time agreed on by the parties involved. In no case may transfers be made outside the state. An affirmative vote by at least two-thirds of the county's cotton farmers who vote will permit such transfers for the upland cotton crop during 1970.

Cotton allotment transfers were provided by the 1965 Food and Agriculture Act, and past referenda on this question have applied to growing seasons through 1969. The Congress voted to extend the act to cover the 1970 crop year, and the current referendum will decide the question of transfers for the single year 1970.

Mr. Griffin said, "We hope all producers will vote. The vote should be fully representative of the wishes of cotton farmers in our county."

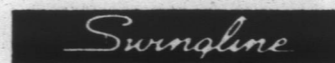
