> Spanish Pig Feet Cook pig feet until half done. Change the water and add one can tomato sauce, three chopped onions, two diced white potatoes, salt, pepper and garlic salt to taste. Cook until tender. Very delicious.

Now here is a recipe for a delicious dessert, given to me by Carol Weyant, who says it is rich, fattening and delicious:

Gobs Cream together two cups sugar, 1/2 cup oleo or crisco and 2 eggs. Sift together 4 cups flour, 2 tsp. scda, 1/2 tsp. baking powder, 11/2 tsp. salt and 3/4 cup cocoa. Add alternately with flour and creamed mixture, 1 cup milk, 1 cup boiling water and 1 tsp. vanilla. Drop from tablespoons on ungreased baking sheet. Bake at 450 degrees for 5 minutes. Cool, then spread the following frosting: 2 tbsp. cornstarch, ½ cup milk, 1 cup crisco, 1 cup sugar, 1 cup confectioners' sugar and 1 tsp. vanilla. Cook over low heat, cornstarch and milk until thick. Cool. Cream crisco and sugar. Blend first mixture with creamed sugar and crisco, then add confectioners' sugar
