Mrs. Gayle Gieseke and Mrs. Julia Hassell attended a National Legislative Conference March 3-5, sponsored by the National Federation of Business and Professional Women's Clubs, Inc., in Washington, D. C. Approximately 1,000 women from throughout the country attended the three-day conference, the purpose of which was to encourage women to become involved in all phases of legislative and political action.

Lt. Gov. Mary Anne Krupsak, of New York headed the list of successful women who participated in the conference.

Campaign strategies and techniques were the focus of political action workshops conducted by Betsy Wright, executive director of the National Women's Education Fund. Men and women directly involved in political campaigns were the participants in these workshops.

A highlight of the conference was the appearance of President Gerald Ford who praised the delegation for their interest and involvement in politics on local levels as well as State and Federal.

Other highlights included a banquet speech by Rep. Millicent Fenwick of New Jersey; a panel discussion on delegate selection by Mary Louise Smith, chairman, Republican National Committee, and Caroline Wilkins, vice chairman, Democratic National Committee, and a congressional breakfast with members of the U. S. Congress hosted by Sen. Mark Hatfield and Bob Packwood of Oregon.

Much of Thursday was spent on Capital Hill, visiting and discussing important legislative items with the Congressmen and Senators.

The climax for the conference was a tour of the White House as guests of President and Mrs. Ford with special privileges not extended tourists.

Anything truly beautiful is always in fashion, as Erica Wilson proves in "Fashion Fun and Costumes" on "ERICA" Monday at 6 P.M. and Wednesday at 7 P.M. on Channel 2. Embroidery that adorned 18th Century dresses and morning robes can look just as beautiful on your 20th Century wardrobe.

Erica takes a simple muslin wraparound skirt, works crewel designs on squares, attaches them to the skirt for pockets and voila! The basic classic skirt looks like an expensive acquisition.

She uses the easy, free-form lazy daisy stitch to decorate large-knit sweaters. But beautiful stitching has a practical side too, as Erica demonstrates when she mends a moth-holed sweater. Petalled flowers embroidered over the holes add years to the life of a once-ruined sweater. Erica also shows interesting ways to use the old-fashioned darning stitch and how to mend - beautifully - L-shaped tears.

Ribbons transformed into belts, dandelions, stitched onto bluejeans, personalized T-shirts, handmade tote bags and clogs, and smocking for a look of the traditional English farmer are other lessons on this week's program.
