Vineyards Given round Chowan County **Profile Award**

Tow Spotted Spider Mites are really building up in corn, fields and some vegetable fields here in Chowan County. Our first suggestion to you is not to mow any headland or ditch banks as this will tend to move the mites from the grass and weeds into your field. You may have observed, the mite build up begins around grassy spots in the field such as telephone poles or at the end of the row. For this reason, we believe that you should consider spraying your headland with material in order to cut down the number of mites before they

spraying the headlands you can use material that is not cleared to be applied on growing crops. If you are going to try this, we suggest that your spray with Azodrine at the rate of 1 pint plus 1/4 pint of Fundal or Galacreon. We also suggest that you use at least 30 gallons of water in applying this material and to come back within 5 days with another application. Once the mites build up in a peanut field or a corn field, they are really difficult to bring under control. This is our reason for suggesting that you try to control them before they get into the field

move into the field. By from grass that might be drying up.

If you are considering using Kylar on your peanuts in 1976, we believe that it is fast approaching the time for application of this material. Kylar is a growth inhibitor that shortens the inner-nodes of peanuts and will reduce the amount of foliage at digging time. It will also give you an opportunity for the air and sun to maybe help control some of the diseases that tend to build up. Last year the leaves shedded on many fields of peanuts and southern stem rot really became a problem right before harvest. Kylar may prevent some of this

shedding if leaf spot and insects are controlled. If you are considering using Terrachlor for southern stem rot on peanuts, we suggest two applications, putting 5 lbs. of actual material, which will be about 12 lbs. of 40 per cent to the acre in each application. 
