

Edenton Savings & Loan Assets Reach \$1.5-Million

Edenton Savings & Loan Association made 151 home loans during the Bicen-tennial year which totaled \$3,065,850. They brought the financial institution's total mortgage loans to \$10,472,798.

J. Clarence Leary, Sr., president, pointed this out to shareholders at their annual meeting Monday night.

Leary also reported that assets increased \$1.5-million during 1976 and savings increased \$1.3-million.

"We paid our largest dividend of \$600,661 in 1976, compared with \$509,412 in 1975," the president reported.

Calling attention to the fact that the association is a "people's" group, he said the opportunity to operate a business is not a right, but a

privilege. "We pledge to you that Edenton Savings & Loan will continue to provide excellent savings and loan services—conveniently and efficiently—in order to merit your continued support," he continued.






