Programs and convention handbooks are also being prepared by these students for all visitors.

Energetic D. F. Walker SGA members have planned and carried out details necessary during the convention. With the cooperation of the system's Food Service Department, a banquet will be held in the school's cafeteria and served by students. Parents

from all schools are making cookies and other delectables to refresh conventionaires during rest breaks over the two day period.

White Oak and Swain students undauntedly solicited and received souvenir items, and door prizes, and convention supplies from merchants and businesses in the county. The willingness, enthusiasm, and interest shown by these contributors in today's youth has been a reassuring factor for these young students. Teapot name tags for all have been made by the White Oak members and convention supply packets stuffed by Swain students.

Community spirit has been extended through Historic Edenton, Inc., and the Edenton Woman's Club. On the last day of the convention, the Coupla House, the Iredell House, the Courthouse, and the Barker House will be open for all delegates. Also, members of the Edenton Woman's Club will act as tour guides on buses which will take students on a riding tour of historic Edenton.

Aiding in feeding the masses, the Chowan Home Demonstration Club will be preparing bag lunches for all on Saturday. Colonial Park will be the waterfront setting for a devotional planned by Chowan High on Sunday morning.

To name every person, SGA member, resident, and business working together to carry the "Torch" for the convention would be impossible. However, the state theme "Torch - Today Our Reach concerns Humanity" is being exemplified through this school community effort.
