Tips On Remodeling

If you're building a house or remodeling, starting the job on paper is the best way to begin.

According to specialists with the North Carolina Agricultural Extension Service, you can avoid costly mistakes in the building and purchase of materials by careful planning and proper design.

Some of the principles of economical design for old or new structure include:

A basic two-story house costs less per square foot to build than a single story one because less roof area is required.

Rectangular floor plans

cost less per square foot to build than L-shaped, U-shaped or other irregular floor plans.

Simple gable roofs are the most economical. Flat and shed roofs are cheaper but offer poor drainage and high maintenance costs.

Preheat the oven only when necessary. Foods that take over an hour to cook do not require a preheated oven.

When using a range with the pyrolytic self-cleaning feature, send it through the cycle after using the oven for cooking while it is still warm to save energy.
