A maximum of Of Edenton \$250,000 is available for funding of each project. Carrier Window Air Conditioners

North Carolina will apply for funds under the program to promote ridesnaring through the establishment of lower van loan rates, up to three park and ride lots, a buspooling incentive program, and a ridesharing marketing program.

Charlotte, Greensboro, High Point, Winston-Salem, Durham, Chapel Hill and Raleigh have participated in the grant planning process. The application also includes plans to improve the organization of ridesharing promotion in these cities.

Bradshaw said, "Ridesharing is an effective response to the rising cost and fluctuating supply of gasoline, especially in this state where many residents are long-distance commuters. The demonstration program would provide incentives to inceease the percentage of long-distance commuters who participate in rideshare programs."

In other public transportation-related business, the board received information concerning requests for allocation of \$55,350 in state funds for planning public transportation programs in cities and non-urban areas statewide. The state funds would be matched by \$50,050 in local monies and \$421,600 in federal funding. The board is expected to take action on these requests at the July meeting in Stanly


