

### Improvements Slated

**MISENHEIMER** — The North Carolina Board of Transportation, at its monthly meeting here July 12, approved \$24-million for secondary road improvements during the next 12 months.

In allocating the money, the board appropriated these funds for each county, based on a formula prescribed by the General Assembly. According to this formula, each county receives a percentage of the total funds available, determined by the unpaved miles of secondary roads in the county in relation of the mileage of unpaved secondary roads in the state. In January of this year, the board has allocated \$15-million in highway bond funds as a result of the 1977 bond issue for secondary road improvements, making a total of \$39-million for projects for 1979-80.

Board members met this spring with the 100 county boards of commissioners in public meetings across the state to review and approve projects to utilize these funds. Work began on these projects earlier this year with funds from the bond issue and will continue with the monies approved July 13.

### Peanut Market News

**Southeastern Section** — Trading of peanuts grown in the Southeast was fairly slow. Demand was fairly light and prices were unchanged. Crop is in very good condition. Widespread rains in the Southeast provided needed moisture. Hoisting and pegging continued ahead of normal in Georgia. Prices paid per pound for shelled Runner Type peanuts, old crop (1978) sold on an FOB shipping point basis for July shipment, unless otherwise stated, were for Jumbo mostly 37½ cents; Medium a few 36, for August shipment a few 35½ to 35¼; Number One mostly 33½; U.S. Splits July to mid-August mostly 35½; new crop Jumbo September to December shipment 36.

**Virginia-North Carolina Section** — Trading for peanuts grown in the Virginia-North Carolina area was fairly slow. Demand was fairly light. Prices were higher for fancys and unchanged for other grades. Shellers were hesitant to sell at buyers offers, resulting in only occasional sales of new crop peanuts. Stands of peanut crop are generally good but growth has been slow due to cool temperatures, and plant size is small. Moisture

Transportation Secretary Tom Bradshaw commended the Chowan County Commissioners and Chairman C. A. Phillips for their role in developing the plan as representatives of the citizens of their county.

According to Bradshaw as of January 1, 1979, the county has 143 miles of paved secondary roads. The number of unpaved miles is 33 while the total unpaved state-maintained secondary system contains 19,673 miles of unpaved roads. Chowan County's share of secondary road monies is \$25,949 from the bond funds. The latest allocation is approximately \$40,500.

Bradshaw noted that the entire 59,413 miles of secondary roads are "important home-to-work routes for all North Carolinians as the board strives to build and maintain an all-weather secondary road network."

"The active partnership between state and local officials and the participation by the public has been extremely valuable in developing our transportation system as a key part of Governor Jim Hunt's balanced growth and economic development policy," he said.

**Southwestern Section** — Trading for peanuts grown in the Southwest was slow. Demand was light. Supplies were light. Prices were unchanged. Planting was practically finished in Texas. Crop condition is good but moisture is needed. New crop sales continue to be few. Prices paid per pound for Southwestern grown peanuts, old crop (1978) sold on an FOB shipping point basis for prompt shipment unless otherwise stated were for shelled Spanish Jumbo 39½ cents; Number One 38, July shipment 38¼; Runners Medium July shipment 36; New crop Spanish Jumbo September to April 39¼.

### Funds Now Available

**RALEIGH** — Commerce Secretary D. M. (Lauch) Faircloth announced today that \$94,000 in matching funds is available to non-profit organizations throughout the state to help promote travel and tourism. Grants of up to \$5,000 per project will be made to help initiate new and innovative promotional activities on a local and regional level, Faircloth said.

Applications for funds will be accepted by the Department of Commerce through September 30. Faircloth said the program has provided \$476,000 in assistance to 202 promotional projects across the state since it was
