An exhibit of the landscapes by Annie Leeney are on display at Shepard-Pruden Memorial Library where they will hang throughout August.

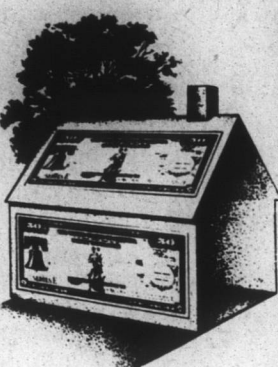

greater understanding of the events of the sixteenth century; archaeological work to attempt to identify native communities visited by the colonists; and literary contests in the schools of the nation.

The group will also hear a report of a fact-finding subcommittee appointed to study the feasibility of designing and constructing a reproduction of one of the ships that came to Roanoke Island. Composed of Charles B. Wade, Jr., David Stick,

and Dr. H. G. Jones, the subcommittee recently visited boatbuilders in Dare and Carteret counties with William A. Baker, noted naval architect who designed the Mayflower II and the other most highly regarded historic ship reconstructions.

Chairman Jones will report on his participation in the Sir Francis Drake Quadracentennial in California and on a recent trip to the Arctic where Martin Frobisher made

three explorations prior to the Roanoke colonies.

—William S. Powell of Chapel Hill, prolific author and professor of history at UNC-CH.

Paul Green of Chapel Hill, Pulitzer prize-winning playwright and poet, author of "The Lost Colony."

Dr. Herbert R. Paschal of Greenville, specialist in early North Carolina History and professor of history at ECU.

Dr. Frel M. Owl of Cherokee, former official with the U. S. Bureau of Indian Affairs.

—Elizabeth Vann Moore of Edenton, historian of the Albemarle Area and winner of the Cannon Cup for historic preservation.

—Charles B. Wade, Jr., of Winston-Salem, secretary of the International Advisory Board of R. J. Reynolds Industries and chairman of Old Salem, Inc.

Ex officio members are Thomas J. Pearsall of Rocky Mount, chairman of the Roanoke Island Historical Association; Thomas B. Gray of Buxton, chairman of the Dare Board

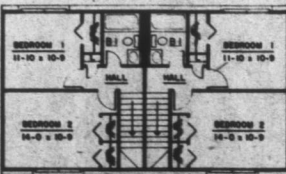

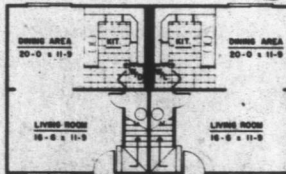
