

Commissioners' Report

The Board of County Commissioners met in regular session on Monday, September 18, 1979, at 9:00 o'clock A.M. in the Fourth Floor Conference Room of the County Office Building as duly advertised.

Members present: C.A. Phillips, Chairman; J.D. Peele, Vice-Chairman; Alan G. Elmore; Lester T. Copeland; and George E. Jones.

The meeting was called to order by the Chairman and Commissioner Elmore gave the invocation.

On motion by Commissioner Copeland, seconded, and unanimously carried, the minutes of the previous meetings were approved as submitted.

Dr. Robert (Bob) Holman, Department of Environmental Concerns, gave an interesting and informative report on the river project. He introduced Jimmy Overton and Lynn Henry who are assisting him on the project. Dr. Holman showed slides of the river, which showed the Board an insight of how the project is progressing. Dr. Holman said there are 25 collection stations where samples are collected weekly. He also stated the present condition of the river is not as severe as it was last year.

Hazel Elliott, Social Services Director, presented several items to the Board. A motion was made by Commissioner Elmore, seconded by Commissioner Peele, and unanimously carried, that the Social Service Department be authorized to reimburse the Title XX, choreworkers, as requested - total amount \$3,396.27.

Motion was made by Commissioner Copeland, seconded by Commissioner Elmore, and unanimously carried, to authorize a committee to take appropriate action necessary to retain one Eligibility Specialist in the Food Stamp Program presently enrolled by CETA. Since CETA expires in September, local monies will be needed to retain position.

Motion was made by Commissioner Jones, seconded by Commissioner Peele, and unanimously carried, that the special aid supplement (\$6,000.00 to Chowan County) be used for the Medicaid budget - transfer from contingency to Social Services - Medicaid.

R.M. (Pete) Thompson, County Agricultural Extension Agent, introduced

Mrs. Connie Adams Sherrill, successor to Mrs. Gladys White, retired extension agent, to the Board. Mrs. Sherrill is from Bertie County and a graduate of Meredith College. Chairman Phillips welcomed Mrs. Sherrill to Chowan County and wished her happiness in her employment.

Mr. Howard Campbell, District Health Department Director, by letter, requested the Board's input on the need of a mosquito control program. The program would be jointly funded with federal and local monies. The Board members agreed they were interested in such a program and directed the County Manager to gather information on a program to present at a later meeting.

Motion was made by Commissioner Elmore, seconded by Commissioner Peele, and unanimously carried, that the following members be added to the Chowan County Youth Task Force as recommended: Francis Hardiman, Mrs. Graham Bass (Johnnie), Mr. Robert Thornton, and Rev. George H. Cooke. Rev. Cooke replaces Rev. Paul Carlson, who has resigned and Miss Lois Satterfield replaces John Santana.

Mildew Warning Given By Cleaners

Jim Ricks of Ricks Laundry and Cleaners says now is the time to look out for mildew. The recent prolonged high humidity has been ideal for the formation of mildew, especially among clothes and leather goods.

Three things are required for mildew growth: moisture, warmth, and darkness. A telltale musty odor is usually the first sign. Mildew is a living fungus and if allowed to progress will do the same damage as battery acid. Fresh dry air, sunshine, and even cleaning is necessary to kill mildew. If it is not practical to empty your closets, at least open the doors and direct fresh air from an electric fan through the area.

Get rid of the "musties" in your home with nature's own remedy, fresh dry air and sunshine. Your cleaner may be able to salvage some items if they are stained.

A motion was made by Commissioner Peele, seconded by Commissioner Elmore, unanimously carried, that the petition from the property owners for the State to maintain Chowan Trail at Chowan Beach be approved and forwarded to the Department of Transportation.

A motion was made by Commissioner Elmore, seconded by Commissioner Peele, that the County accept State's figures of 19 cents per mile for county travel. The motion unanimously carried.

Commissioner Elmore made a motion that the County Manager be authorized to seek assistance with the financial accounting for the County. Commissioner Copeland seconded the motion and motion unanimously carried.

Election Results Important To Area Farmers

ASC COMMITTEE ELECTIONS: (November 23 to December 3, 1979) The election of responsible concerned farmers to positions on ASC Committees is important to all farmers. Farm programs that are administered by ASC State and County Committees include:

- 1) Commodity Price Support loans and payments.
- 2) Grain reserves.
- 3) Long range, annual and emergency conservation costsharing.
- 4) Establishment of allotments and marketing quotas.
- 5) Farm storage facility and dryer loans.
- 6) Incentive, indemnity and disaster payments for some commodities.
- 7) Other farm disaster assistance.

On October 4, petitions will be mailed to all eligible voters to nominate the farmer candidates. Three eligible voters must sign

each petition. Each community should nominate at least six.

Farm owners, operators, tenants and sharecroppers, 18 or older, may vote in the election if they are eligible to take part in any ASCS Program authorized by Federal Legislation.

RETURN OF TOBACCO MARKETING CARDS: As soon as your 1979 tobacco sales are completed, you should return your tobacco marketing cards to the ASCS office. In the event a card is lost or misplaced please come in and report it so necessary forms can be filed and farm sales reconciled.

REPORT OF CARRYOVER TOBACCO REQUIRED: Flue-cured tobacco farm operators will be required to file a carryover tobacco report for 1979. This report will be obtained from producers when their marketing cards are returned to the county

office. Failure to make the report could result in an allotment reduction for 1980. Negative reports are required.

FALL TOBACCO LEASE AND TRANSFER: Lease and transfer agreements can be filed now through November 30th provided both the leasee and lessor farm planted 80 per cent of their effective allotment. Farms exceeding the farm allotment are not eligible to lease and transfer.

NEXT TOBACCO REDESIGNATION PERIOD: The next period for growers to redesignate tobacco warehouses begins Monday, October 1 and ends Friday, October 5. Tobacco redesignated during this period will be eligible for price support beginning Monday, October 15th.

FARM STORAGE AND DRYING EQUIPMENT LOAN PROGRAM: Producers needing on-the-

farm grain storage facilities and drying equipment should contact the ASCS Office concerning loans available to finance construction of the needed facilities and purchase of drying equipment. The maximum loan amount is 85 per cent of the cost of the structures and equipment. Loan repayment terms allow for a maximum of 7 equal annual installments over a period of 8 years. The interest rate is 10.5 per cent. This rate will remain in effect for the life of the loan. If you are in need of storage

and handling equipment come in and let us discuss our loan program with you. Storage can be the key to making a profit.

REMINDERS: 1. Peanut producers can pick up marketing cards at the county office or if you cannot visit the office call and we will mail cards to you. 2. This office will be closed October 8 legal holiday.
