


Transportation Needs Discussed

RALEIGH - Public meetings to discuss transportation needs and priorities are being held across the state this week. The meetings are part of

the annual update of the North Carolina Department of Transportation's Transportation Improvement Program (TIP).

The TIP is the basic planning document for the transportation department that balances anticipated revenues against estimated project expenditures. The first TIP was approved by the North Carolina Board of Transportation in October 1978.







REGISTRATION BOOKS WILL CLOSE FOR THIS ELECTION ON TUESDAY, APRIL 8, 1980, AT 5:00 P.M.

Any person who has been a resident of Chowan County for 30 days is eligible to register and vote. He must be 18 years of age by the date of the election, November 4, 1980. Any person who will become qualified by age or residence to register and vote in the general election for which the primary is held, even though not so qualified by the date of the primary, shall be entitled to register for the primary and general election prior to the primary and then to vote in the primary after being registered.

Any person who has moved from one precinct within the county to another should be sure that he transfers to the precinct in which he is now living. The deadline for this transfer is April 8, 1980.

ABSENTEE VOTING WILL BE ALLOWED: First day to apply for Absentee Ballots: March 7th. Deadline for applying for Absentee Ballots: April 30 (5 P.M.)
